Executive Summary

Curricular Aspects

Netaji Nagar Day College offers undergraduate programmes in Science, Humanities and Commerce and postgraduate programme in Commerce. The curricula in all these programmes are those framed by the University of Calcutta to which the College is affiliated. The College does not have the autonomy to modify the curricula. The College endeavours to achieve effective delivery and transaction of the University stipulated curricula in all courses offered by the institution.

The College offers a wide range of subjects, both in the Honours and General stream, in Science and Humanities. The Honours courses offered in Science are Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Mathematics, Computer Science, Geography and Economics. The Honours courses offered in Humanities are Bengali, English, History, Political Science. The College offers the B.Sc. General course of study with three elective subjects from Physics, Mathematics, Chemistry / Computer Science/Electronics. Another option is to pursue the B.Sc. (Bio) General course with three elective subjects from Physiology, Zoology, Botany / Chemistry.

The College ensures strict adherence to the academic calendar of the University of Calcutta by holding classes as scheduled, conducting the internal examinations within the stipulated time, completing the internal evaluation process before students fill up forms for appearing at University examinations (Part I, Part II and Part III under the 1+1+1 annual system).

The faculty maintains close contact with the Board of Studies in various disciplines for updated knowledge regarding changes in the curricula, if any, and also for communicating their feedback on the curricula. Two members of the faculty from the departments of Commerce and Electronics are members of the Board of Studies in their respective disciplines and participate in all deliberations regarding curricular aspects.

Sincere efforts are made by the College for inculcating the much needed values in students through effective delivery of the curriculum in various subjects. The cherished values are inherent in the curricula framed by the University of Calcutta, a NAAC accredited institution. The courses offered by the institution emphasize the social, economic, cultural and economic realities at the local, national and international levels and thereby contribute towards fulfilling the institution's vision of providing a well resourced, strongly academic, holistic education to young learners in such a way that it will create an environment "where the mind is without fear and the head is held high and knowledge is free."

Teaching- Learning and Evaluation

The process of admission to all undergraduate programmes and the postgraduate programme in Commerce offered by the College is transparent as wide publicity is given to the process. Admission notices are published on the College website and Notice Board. The College ensures strict adherence to the University stipulated admission criteria for all courses. The Merit lists are displayed on the College website as well as on the Notice Board. In conformity to the guidelines prescribed by the University of Calcutta and the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal for the 2015-16 academic session onwards, the College has adopted the Online system of application for admission and preparation of Merit lists for admission. Reservation of seats for the disadvantaged sections in accordance with Government rule, is ensured.

The College endeavours to make the teaching-learning process student-centric. Though the chalk-and-talk method of teaching is mainly followed, efforts are made to supplement the traditional method with power point presentations, practical demonstrations, field trips, excursions, seminars/workshops/invited lectures by experts, etc. There is a special provision for slow learners who can attend the Remedial coaching held beyond College hours. The process of internal evaluation through class test, Mid-Term test and College (selection) test before students are allowed to fill up forms for appearing at University examinations, is planned and executed in conformity to the academic calendar drawn up by the affiliating University.

The College has adequate faculty in all courses of study offered by the College. Vacant faculty positions (government sanctioned) are filled up by appointment of well qualified faculty on the basis of recommendations of the West Bengal College Service Commission. Till such permanent vacancy is filled up, the College appoints temporary Guest faculty having UGC prescribed qualification through the process of advertisement in leading newspaper followed by interview by a Selection Committee duly constituted by the Governing Body, and comprising of subject experts, Governing Body member and the Principal. The faculty is encouraged to participate in faculty upgradation programmes, seminars/workshops/conferences at regular intervals, and also to undertake research activity. As a result, a significant section of the faculty have achieved doctoral degree, undertaken postdoctoral research, UGC funded Minor Research Projects, served as resource person in seminars/workshops organized by other institutions, etc. Student evaluation of teachers is in practice in this institution.

Research, Consultancy and Extension

The College has been making efforts for developing research culture among the faculty and students within the constraints faced due to limited space and other resources. The faculty is encouraged to undertake research activity, for doctoral/postdoctoral achievements, for research projects funded by the UGC and other bodies, or for publications. The Research Committee reviews the project proposals to be submitted by faculty for financial assistance from the UGC.

In the post-accreditation period, 10 (ten) faculty members have received doctoral degree, 03 (three) faculty members have received M. Phil degree, one faculty member has submitted PhD thesis at Jadavpur University in August 2015, 04 (four) faculty members have registered for doctoral research, and 07 (seven) UGC funded Minor Research Projects have been undertaken.

The faculty extends consultancy services in its areas of expertise to other institutions, primarily educational, on honorary basis. The areas include tax consultancy, postgraduate teaching in various disciplines, paper-setting, moderation, evaluation in connection with examinations of other Universities, membership of selection committee for recruitment in Government agencies, advisory services relating to research in Rabindrasangeet and in multimedia designing, school education, etc. Such consultancy has not generated any revenue for the institution so far.

The College has a tradition of reaching out to the community at large, especially to the less privileged in the neighbourhood who aspire for higher education. Extension activity is undertaken through the two NSS units of the College. The outreach programmes range from annual Blood Donation camp, planting of trees, health awareness campaigns, etc. to Special NSS camp in the adopted slum in the neighbourhood. The institution is proud of its NSS Programme Officers and student volunteers who have received awards for best performance in different years from the University of Calcutta.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The College has to cope up with space constraint as the premises are shared with Netaji Nagar College which runs in the evening shift. There are two three –storied buildings shared by Netaji Nagar Day College and Netaji Nagar College in the day and evening shifts respectively. An almost adjacent playground is also shared by the Colleges. Maximum possible utilization of the available space and other resources is ensured. The College has a central Library which also houses the UGC Network Resource Centre and is well endowed with books, journals and periodicals. Partial automation of library services has already been achieved. The College subscribes to the N-List programme of INFLIBNET, thereby enabling its faculty and students to access e-resources. The College ensures collection

development of library resources in every academic session by utilizing funds received from the UGC and the state government when available, otherwise from internal budgetary resources.

The Science departments are equipped with laboratories which are upgraded with necessary equipments and facilities at regular intervals. There is a common IT lab equipped with ten computers having internet facility for use by all the departments in addition to a separate IT lab for the Department of Commerce as well as computer labs for the Departments of Computer Science, Electronics and Physics.

Student Support and Progression

The student profile shows a significant proportion of women as well as disadvantaged sections. This indicates the commitment to the institutional vision and mission of ensuring maximum access to students from diverse socio-economic background so that the opportunity of receiving higher education is not denied to the economically less privileged and to the first generation learners. For this purpose, the College has been providing student support services in the form of tuition fee concessions, remedial coaching free of cost, Govt. service entry level coaching without/with nominal fee, career guidance etc.

The performance of students of this College in University examinations, especially in Honours courses, over the last five years, is good compared to the overall pass percentage of the University. The performance of students in University examinations in General courses needs improvement. The postgraduate course in Commerce offered by this College has recorded a very high pass percentage every year since its introduction in 2007-08. A significant number of students of this College secure 1st class marks in all Honours courses and in the postgraduate course every year.

The progression of students to post graduate courses of study is not very high. A significant section of students are forced to take up jobs after graduation and some of them even during their undergraduate courses due to financial compulsions in their family. The students of the postgraduate course in Commerce are able to secure good jobs in business and industry.

An interesting feature of this institution is the spontaneous participation of students in sports and games at the intra and inter-College levels. Several prizes and awards are won by them every year. The College Football, Cricket and Rowing teams have emerged as winners/runners almost every year in various inter-college tournaments. The players are allowed tuition fee concession and also provided sportswear and sports shoes by the College.

Students also participate in cultural programmes organized on the occasion of College Foundation Day, "Rabindrajayanti," "Dol-utsav", and College Fest. The dates of national importance such as Netaji's Birthday, Republic Day, Independence Day and Calcutta University Foundation Day are also observed with due honour and respect by the College.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The College is governed according to Statute 93 of the University of Calcutta First Statutes 1979 by a Governing body comprising of representatives from the University, the state government, the local body, teaching and non-teaching staff and students. Its meetings are convened by the Principal who is the Secretary of the Governing Body and chaired by the President who is elected by the members. Democratic and decentralized governance is followed. The various activities (academic, co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension) are entrusted to the sub-committees constituted by the Governing Body or by the Teachers' Council. The Principal as the academic and administrative head of the institution, supervises and co-ordinates the working of different sub-committees. Participatory management is encouraged.

Financial decisions are taken by the Finance Committee and subsequently approved by the Governing Body. The accounts are audited regularly by the Government appointed auditor. Accounting norms are adhered to and strict financial discipline is maintained. As a result, the institutional budget has no deficit till date. Audited utilization certificate is submitted within due date to the UGC and the state government for the infrastructural grants received by the College.

Innovations and Best Practices

The College has an active Science and Nature Club which organizes exhibitions and awareness programmes for creating environment consciousness among the students and staff. The West Bengal Renewable Agency Development Agency (WBREDA) has been approached for installation of renewable energy devices at subsidized rate in the College, and also for organizing awareness programmes on use of renewable energy. Efforts are made to establish a plastic-free campus. Tobacco is strictly prohibited in the campus.

The two best practices of this institution are:

- (i) Widening the access to higher education for economically weaker section of the society.
- (ii) Noteworthy participation of students in sports and games and in extension activity.

In order to fulfill the vision and mission of the founders who desired to establish a seat of higher learning within the reach of the hapless people displaced from their roots in erstwhile East Pakistan, the College has been following a policy of offering maximum

access so that students belonging to disadvantaged section of the society can also get the opportunity of higher education. The College strictly adheres to the reservation policy of the Government for admission of students to different courses of study offered. Remedial coaching for slow learners from SC/ST/OBC/Minority community is provided free of cost, by utilizing UGC grant. Govt. service Entry Level Coaching is also provided free of cost to final year and passed out students belonging to SC/ST/OBC/Minority community under the UGC funded scheme. Tuition fee and lab charge concession is provided to a significant number of students from economically weaker section of the society in every academic session. The fee collected from all students under Students' Relief Fund is also promptly disbursed to those students who face severe financial crisis. The large number of students belonging to disadvantaged groups taking admission in various courses offered by this institution bears evidence of the success of the policy and practice of this institution to widen the access to higher education.

Students, many of whom are from disadvantaged section of the society, have various inherent potential and capability in the field of performing arts, sports and games etc. Under active institutional encouragement, such potential can be groomed to maturity and may well become professional pursuits in course of time. Besides, the importance of sports and games for a healthy body and healthy mind cannot be denied especially for the youth. Students' participation in sports and games is actively encouraged by the institution. Outstanding sportsmen are given preference for admission to the courses offered by the College. Tuition fee and lab charge concession is made available to the students who excel in sports and games. Sportswear and sports shoes are provided to the players of the college team. Emerging as champions in Inter-College football tournaments has been a tradition for the College. The cricket team has also emerged as semi- finalist or quarter-finalist in most years. The Rowing team is recently doing very well and emerged as runners at the BRC Inter-College Rowing Championship in 2015. Athletes from the College have also won medals at the State and District level competitions.

The College is aware of the Institutional Social Responsibility and seeks to ensure students' awareness and commitment to the needs of the less privileged in the neighbourhood. Extension activities are undertaken through the NSS units of the College. Such activities are varied in nature ranging from spreading awareness against 'Drug Abuse', 'Illicit Trafficking' 'Voters' Awareness campaign to planting trees, special camp in adopted slum neighbouring Khanpur area, Blood Donation camp etc. The wide range of extension activities successfully undertaken over the years by the College through the NSS units is ample evidence of success of such institutional endeavour. The NSS volunteers from the College have been awarded Best Male Volunteer and Best Female Volunteer in 2010-11 and 2011-12 and as Best Female Volunteer in 2012-13. The Programme Officers of NSS units of the College have also won the awards of Best Programme Officer in 2009-10 and again in 2012-13.

SWOC Analysis

Strengths:

The College originated from the intense desire of the hapless people displaced from their ancestral roots in erstwhile East Pakistan, to establish a seat of higher learning within the reach of the less privileged. The real strength of this institution is its humble beginning in terms of building and other resources. From there it expanded to such a magnitude that trifurcation became inevitable in 1986 and Netaji Nagar Day College was born. This institution has always been preferred by the students from the neighbouring areas which have been primarily colonies of settlers from the then East Pakistan. The mission of the College has been to widen the access to higher education. Simplicity in every respect without compromising on quality education has enabled the institution to maintain tuition fee and other charges at a minimum level till date. Hence maximum access to students from various socio-economic and educational backgrounds is ensured. The overall atmosphere is congenial for imparting higher education to young men and women in a progressive enlightened ambience. Students are especially enthusiastic about sports and games and participate successfully in inter-college events. The College has well-qualified and motivated faculty, efficient and honest non-teaching staff and talented students. Though primarily an undergraduate institution, the College has been offering, very successfully, the postgraduate course in Commerce since 2007-08 despite several constraints in infrastructure.

Weaknesses:

The premises are shared with Netaji Nagar College which runs in the evening shift from 2.30 pm. During the overlapping hours, the College faces the problem of inadequate space. The space constraint has been inhibiting the growth of the institution. Proper maintenance of the buildings and renovation works are difficult to implement as prior consensus of the decision making bodies of both Colleges is required for the same.

Opportunities:

The College has been exploring the possibility of constructing a second campus on the plot of land owned jointly with Netaji Nagar College. This would solve the problem of space inadequacy to a considerable extent.

If the space constraint can be overcome, the College would be able to introduce certificate course in computer education with the help of the Computer Science department, and also a certificate course in communicative English with the help of the Department of English.

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Besides, other certificate courses and postgraduate course in some subjects now offered only as undergraduate courses, could also be introduced.

Challenges:

The College has been facing the challenge of ensuring maximum number of teaching days due to the long drawn out examination schedule of the affiliating University. The premises are shared by two Colleges, both of which are allotted examination centres of the University of Calcutta alternatively.

Students lack communicative skill in English. Under the 1+1+1 annual system of University examination, the time available is not enough for additional grooming of students over and above the University stipulated curricula in various disciplines.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

The vision and mission of Netaji Nagar Day College are as follows:

Vision:

The College aspires to be a leading College in Kolkata, providing a well-resourced strongly academic, holistic education to boys and girls in such a way that it will create an environment "where the mind is without fear, the head is held high and knowledge is free".

Mission:

- To offer equal opportunity of access to all.
- A differentiated approach to teaching that encourages all students to participate fully in the process of learning.
- To encourage and motivate students to achieve their full potential whilst recognizing and commenting their efforts, achievements and success.
- To provide a safe and caring environment that will promote close relations between the three sections of the academic community - Students, Teachers and Non-teaching employees.
- To provide a value based system of education such that students will participate in all co-curricular activities which will improve their health and mind and also encourage them to participate in welfare activities having 'community orientation'.

Objectives:

As an institution committed to providing higher education and holistic development of young boys and girls, the objectives of the institution envisages certain social responsibilities:

- i) Addressing the need of empowerment of youth in general and less privileged sections in particular through socio-economically strengthening and ability enhancing education to students, many of whom hail from the disadvantaged groups.
- ii) Rendering the curriculum based education relevant and ensuring applicability of the same by preparing them with sustainable skills for employment.

iii) Endeavouring to inculcate in students in the process of imparting education, the modern, progressive, liberal, secular philosophy embedded in the curriculum.

The vision, mission and objectives of the College are communicated to every new batch of students by teachers during the introductory lectures delivered in each course of study. The newly admitted students become familiar with the institution's vision, mission and objectives also through interaction with the senior students as well as with the office bearers and other members of the Students' Union.

The other major stakeholders- teachers and non-teaching staff – are made aware of the institutional vision, mission and objectives at the time of joining by the Principal, senior teachers and senior non-teaching staff of the College in a cordial mode. Special occasions like the Foundation Day celebrations, Annual Sports, Commemorative functions serve as additional opportunities for the stakeholders to witness a reaffirmation of the institutional vision, mission and objectives in the address made by the Principal and other senior staff members.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

For effective implementation of the curriculum in various courses of study, departmental meetings are held for at regular intervals topic allotment/assignment to respective teachers commensurate with their specialization, research interest/concerns and in view of permissible limit of classes that can be taken by each teacher (full time/part-time/guest). Departmental meetings also ensure regular follow-up to monitor the successful implementation and timely assessment of lesson progress made by respective departmental teachers. Efforts are made by individual teachers to render the curriculum delivery conducive to the learning abilities of students. Remedial classes are held to address the needs of slow learners to ensure effective curriculum delivery.

Parent-teacher meetings are held to facilitate communication between parents/guardians and teachers on the academic performance of the ward/student. Such a mechanism also provides an opportunity to communicate on curriculum delivery by all stakeholders, viz. students, teachers and guardian/parents.

- 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?
 - (a) The support received from the affiliating University by the teachers are as follows:
 - (i) Workshops and seminars on syllabus are organized by the University and also by the affiliated Colleges of the University at regular intervals.
 - (ii) Refresher Courses on various subjects are organized by the UGC-Academic Staff College of the University. These courses provide very effective procedural and practical support to teachers in effective translation of the curriculum.
 - (iii) The syllabus stipulated by the University provides a well-defined delineation of the broad areas clearly in a logical sequence. It also contains a comprehensive reading list that enables teachers to follow the curriculum as designed by the University.
 - (b) The support received from the institution by the teachers are as follows:
 - (i) The College encourages research initiatives of faculty and participation in seminars, workshops, Orientation and Refresher Courses for enhancing their teaching skills and interaction with the faculty from other institutions.
 - (ii) The College provides infrastructural and financial support for organizing curriculum-based workshops and departmental seminars wherein students can also participate.
 - (iii) The College library and seminar libraries of various departments have updated stock of books prescribed in the syllabus and also those that are part of recommended reading list of the University's curriculum.
 - (iv) The College library is equipped with computers having internet facility that allows teachers to gain easy access to e-resources for updated information required for curriculum delivery.
 - (v) The College library provides access to on-line journals under N-List programme of INFLIBNET that enables teachers to explore reading resources widely for a more enriched transaction of the curriculum.

- (vi) The College ensures budgetary allocation in every academic session for enhancing the infrastructural provisions and endowments of the library, and the departmental laboratories etc. required for effective translation of the curriculum.
- 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The institutional initiatives include:

- (a) The College ensures strict adherence to the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating University for all courses offered.
- (b) Regular meetings of the Academic Sub-Committee, comprising of all heads of departments, are held to ensure adherence to the University's stipulated academic calendar. This enables the College and its respective departments to allot portions of the curriculum and plan its successful delivery and completion within the given time frame provided by the University's academic calendar.
- (c) The College library and the departmental seminar libraries are well endowed with books recommended in the Reading list of the syllabus and also those books that are additionally relevant to the syllabus/curriculum prescribed by the affiliating University for reference. In addition the library also subscribes to relevant journals of various disciplines for use of both teachers and advanced learners.
- (d) Assignment of teaching responsibilities based on the curriculum is mostly done according to individual teacher's area of specialization and competence to ensure effective delivery of the curriculum.
- (e) For quality enhancement of the faculty, the College encourages research engagements of teachers (Doctoral/ post-Doctoral/Minor Research Projects) and also re-training of teachers through participation in seminars/workshops/Refresher Courses and Orientation Courses. These courses enable teachers to update their knowledge-base, improve their knowledge imparting skills and to be better equipped for delivering the updated contents of the curriculum to their students.
- (f) Remedial classes are held as supplementary initiatives for slow learners and ensure effective communication of the curriculum across students of varying learning abilities.

- (g) Teachers also provide and circulate additional study materials and referenced notes to supplement class lectures delivered to ensure that students are adequately equipped with reading/study resources to cope with the demands of the curriculum.
- (h) The College obtains feedback from students by administering structured questionnaire on individual teacher's performance. Students' assessment of the teacher's performance serves as a definitive institutional mechanism to ensure effective curriculum delivery.
- 1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?
 - (a) Interaction and Network with the Affiliating University, viz. the University of Calcutta:
 - ➤ The College maintains regular interaction and networks with the University to ensure strict adherence to all norms prescribed by the University. Teachers maintain close contact with senior postgraduate faculty of respective departments.
 - At present, two faculty members of the College are members of the UG Board of Studies in Commerce and Electronics. Other teachers of the College are also in regular interaction with their respective UG Board of Studies on curriculum related issues. They also communicate the difficulties faced, if any, in the course of curriculum delivery and offer suggestions based on their experiences of curriculum transaction to undergraduate students.
 - ➤ Teachers and students are encouraged to attend workshops, seminars, symposiums organized by the University and various affiliated Colleges.
 - (b) Interaction with Research Bodies:
 - ➤ The teachers of the College maintain active liaison with various research bodies, institutes and academic bodies related to their respective disciplines. These include the Indian Association for the Cultivation of Science, Bengal Economic Association, etc. Such associations are instrumental not only for expansion of research interests but also for effective implementation of the curriculum.

- (c) Interaction with the Industry:
 - There is not much scope for forging direct ties with the industry so far as the undergraduate curriculum in various courses offered by the institution, is concerned.
- 1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

The contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum include:

- (a) Two members of the teaching faculty in the Departments of Commerce and Electronics are presently members of the Undergraduate Board of Studies. They actively participate in the development and framing of the undergraduate syllabus in Commerce and Electronics and communicate their suggestions. As members of the Board of Studies in their respective subjects, they have often conveyed the feedback of students as well as certain practical difficulties faced in the course of implementation of the curriculum.
- (b) Teachers of different departments review the curricula and also attend workshops/seminars on curricula for offering suggestions, based on practical teaching experiences at the undergraduate level, to the Board of Studies of respective departments.
- (c) The College teachers have contributed to the curriculum based Question Bank organized by the affiliating University for respective departments/subjects. Teachers are also appointed as paper setters/moderators by the University whereby they can definitively contribute to the curriculum-based assessment system.
- (d) Teachers are regularly appointed as examiners (for theoretical papers), internal and external examiners (for practical examinations), head examiners/coordinators for both Honours and General Papers for University examinations. Besides, the College is also serving as the Zonal Centre for University's undergraduate examination for several subjects. Script evaluation, examiners meetings' held at the University and the Zonal centres operant within the institutional premises facilitates interaction with the larger community of teachers at both the undergraduate and postgraduate level. Discussions allow teachers to convey their feedback, suggestions and even difficulties. From the

exercise of multiple script assessment and screening they also learn to orient themselves towards newer and revised means to deliver curriculum from the view point of examination and its evolving pattern.

- (e) The College offers postgraduate course in Commerce. The head of the department of Commerce is a member of the Committee which frames the postgraduate syllabus in Commerce offered by the College. The department obtains regular feedback from all students.
- 1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

The College does not have the autonomy to develop and /or restructure the curricula designed by the affiliating University for the undergraduate courses.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

The College offers the following three-year undergraduate Degree courses of the University of Calcutta:

- i) B.A.(Honours) in Bengali, English, Political Science, & History;
- ii) B.Sc. (Honours) in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Computer Science, Botany, Economics, Geography;
- iii) B.A. (General) with the following elective subjects: Political Science, History, Economics, Education, Geography, Elective English, Elective Bengali, Philosophy;
- iv) B.Sc. (General) with the following elective subjects: Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Computer Science, Electronics, Botany, Zoology, Physiology;
- v) B.Com (Honours) in Accounting & Finance, and Marketing;
- vi) B.Com (General).

The college also offers a Post- graduate Degree course in Commerce which is self-financed.

The goals and objectives of the Bachelors' degree courses offered by the College are as follows:

- ➤ To provide students with the foundation for higher studies- post graduation and research;
- ➤ To equip students with the requisite minimum qualification for most competitive examinations of state/central public services;
- > To prepare students for taking up primary and secondary level school teaching as a profession;
- > To groom students for self employment.

The post-graduate course in Commerce is offered by the College to develop human potential with the following objectives:

- To serve the teaching profession at various levels;
- > To meet the needs of research in social sciences;
- To serve the needs of industry at the micro and macro levels.
- 1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning /dual degree? If 'yes', give details.

There is no provision for the College to offer any programme facilitating twinning/dual degree under the existing rules of the University of Calcutta.

- 1.2.3 Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability. A range of Core options and elective options are offered by the College within the guidelines of the affiliating University. For B.A.(Honours), B.Sc.(Honours) two elective subjects from any two groups have to be studied with one honours subject. For B.Com (Honours), two core options (Accounting & Finance, Marketing) are offered, each with its fixed combination of papers.

- 1. Political Sc. & History & Economics/ Education/Geography
- 2. Political Sc. & Education & English/Bengali/Philosophy OR
- 3. History & Geography & English/Bengali

The elective options for B.Sc. (General) course are as follows:

- 1. Physics & Mathematics & Chemistry/Computer Sc./Electronics
 - OR
- 2. Physiology & Zoology & Botany/ Chemistry

There is no scope for choice based credit system, credit transfer or accumulation facility as per University rules. The University conducts three annual examinations-Part I, II and III at the end of 1st, 2nd and 3rd year respectively. Marks are cumulatively transferred from Part I to Part II and from Part II to Part III. Students pursuing Honours course have to appear for eight (8) Honours papers (each of 100 marks) and three (3) General papers for each of two elective subjects. Students pursuing General course have to appear for four (4) General papers (each of 100 marks) for each of three elective subjects over three years.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

The institution at present offers one self financed programme – P.G. Course in Commerce.

The admission criterion for the course is as per norms of the affiliating University. The curriculum followed is the one prescribed by the University of Calcutta for M.Com. course. The fee for this self-financed course is Rs. 9410/-at the time of admission and Rs.1000/- monthly. The fee structure is as approved by the University of Calcutta.

Teacher qualification for posts sanctioned by the govt. is as per UGC norms. The qualification of management appointed full time contractual teachers, part - time and guest lecturers for this self financed programme is:

A minimum of 55% marks at Masters Degree in the relevant subject and preferably NET/SET qualified. The contractual and part time teachers serving the Department of Commerce are all on Govt. pay. The Guest lecturers and Senior Visiting faculty receive honorarium on the basis of classes taken.

- 1.2.5 Does the College provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.
 - i) The College organizes special coaching classes for preparing students for competitive examinations for Govt. services through the Govt. Service Entry Level Coaching Scheme of the UGC.
 - ii) The department of Commerce organised a soft skill development programme with Edulight Learning for the students of M.Com which included listening skill, professional development etc. The course was held from 8th August, 2011 to 18th January, 2012 in the College campus.
 - iii) The Department of Commerce also organised a short term Certificate course on Financial markets (Basic) for the post graduate students, in association with the Centre of Excellence in Financial Markets- a joint venture of Calcutta Stock Exchange and Calcutta University, during 8th to 12th March 2016, in the College campus.

The University Calcutta does not provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1. Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum for ensuring the integration of the academic programmes with the institution's goals and objectives may be mentioned as follows:-

- a) In view of the institutional objective to train young students for employability, the faculty takes care to supplement the given curriculum prescribed by the University with communication of latest developments within the disciplines and their relevance in the national and international sphere. This enables the students to relate the curriculum based theoretical knowledge to the real world situation.
- b) Co-curricular activities of the departments (invited lectures, seminars, wall magazines, excursions, etc.) aimed at interactive teaching and learning ensures integration of institutional goal of complete mental and intellectual development of the students with University's curricula.
- c) Cultural activities, sports and games, extension activities through NSS are encouraged to nurture much needed values and a participatory outlook and thus stimulate a spirit of co-operation, sound understanding and good teamwork among the students and staff of the college.
- d) Students are encouraged to use the library extensively and explore the internet facility available therein. The library stock is always kept updated with purchases of books and journals of various disciplines.
- e) The College ensures that proper equipments and consumables are regularly purchased for laboratories of practical-based subjects to provide effective training to students. Such training supplements the curriculum and also realizes the institutional goal of investing in capacity building.
- 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The College does not have the freedom to modify the curriculum of the existing courses designed by the affiliating University. However, the faculty actively participates in seminars/workshops organized by the University and affiliating Colleges for discussion on necessary modifications of existing courses to meet the needs of the dynamic employment market.

Efforts are made to enrich the process of curriculum transaction and delivery. Departmental seminars are organised with eminent academicians as resource persons to enable students to gain knowledge of latest developments in their respective disciplines. Such knowledge enables students to be better equipped for meeting the needs of the dynamic employment market. Some departments such as Commerce have taken the initiative to organize seminars/workshops on themes specifically related to the modern employment market. The Department of Commerce organised several seminars on topics like Accounting Standard, Financial Planning for Young Investors, etc. (details given under Criterion III) during the period 2008 to 2014, to enlighten the students with the problems and prospects of the modern employment market.

As mentioned in 1.2.2, Govt. Service Entry Level Coaching and Career counselling sessions are also held in the college. These are intended to supplement the curriculum based learning with the aptitude and ability required to succeed in various competitive examinations of the dynamic employment market.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT, etc. into the curriculum.

Environmental issues are part of the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university and Environmental Studies as a compulsory paper is offered to final year students. In order to sensitize the students on environment related issues, various activities are undertaken through the Science & Nature Club of the College. A seminar entitled 'Save the Planet' organized by the Science And Nature Club of the college on 9th & 10th October, 2015 was held very successfully in the college premises to increase the awareness of the students regarding climate change and other environment related issues. In this seminar the students of almost all departments of the college participated with great enthusiasm. In addition, in certain subjects like Geography, Education, Political Science, Biological Sciences, etc., environmental usage, movements, environmental consciousness, environmental pollution and threats constitute a part of the curriculum.

The overall atmosphere prevailing in this co-educational institution is congenial for free interaction among male and female students and staff who undertake all activities together in a cohesive liberal spirit. The Students' Union comprising of both male and female office bearers and student representatives, ensures that girl students can participate in academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities with honour and dignity.

Gender and Human Rights are a part of the curriculum in some subjects like English (texts), Economics, Political Science. Awareness programmes on these cross cutting issues are organised by such units as the Equal Opportunity Centre of the College for sensitizing the students.

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- 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure
 - moral and ethical values
 - employable and life skills
 - better career options
 - community orientation

There is no formal provision to offer a separate course for training in moral and ethical values. The college endeavours to cultivate and nurture in students the much needed values of honesty, discipline, co-operation, righteousness, hard work, sincerity, respect for others, etc., in the course of class lectures, excursions, cultural programmes, seminars/workshops, annual sports and other sporting events, NSS activity, etc. The faculty takes special care to promote a close teacher –student relation conducive to healthy and value-based development of students.

Employable skills are sought to be imparted through Career Counselling sessions organized at regular intervals as well as through Govt. Service Entry level Coaching (UGC funded) scheme periodically. Life skills are sought to be developed mainly through active participation in sports and games for a healthy body and mind. Participation in extension activities through the NSS also serves to promote community orientation, sense of responsibility, spirit of teamwork and self-less service- all very essential for leading a meaningful life.

An active institutional Career Counselling Cell organizes seminars wherein experts from various fields like media, management, civil services are invited to deliver lectures and discuss the relevant career options. Active participation of students in such sessions is strongly encouraged.

The wide range of extension activities of the two NSS Units of the College promotes community orientation through welfare activities like spreading awareness on health and hygiene, reaching out to the less privileged children in the neighbourhood. The NSS units of the college conduct 'Special Camp' in 16, Khanpur Basti every year in the month of February/ March. The student volunteers of NSS look forward eagerly to this programme which provides them the opportunity to interact closely with the residents of the neighbouring slum, especially children with whom they conduct a mini sports and also a cultural programme after training them.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

Feedback on the undergraduate curriculum has not been obtained from stakeholders like students, parents or alumni so far as the institution does not have the freedom to modify the University stipulated curriculum. For the enrichment of the curriculum delivery process, the teaching experiences of the faculty in different disciplines and the responses of learners during classroom lectures is mainly utilised. However, feedback on the postgraduate curriculum in Commerce is obtained from the students and the same is analysed by the Department of Commerce for necessary action. Curriculum transaction, delivery and evaluation are modified in accordance with the needs of learners as revealed by their feedback.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The enrichment programmes includes Remedial Coaching, Govt. Service Entry level Coaching, departmental seminars/workshops, sports and games events, cultural programmes, and extension activities through the NSS. Reports of all such programmes undertaken during each academic session are prepared by the relevant Co-ordinators/ sub-committees and submitted to the IQAC.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The College is guided by the prescribed curriculum of the affiliating University. The scope for contribution to the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University is through:

(i) The membership of two of the faculty members in the Undergraduate Board of Studies in Commerce and in Electronics and the contact maintained by the faculty of different departments with their corresponding Under graduate Board of Studies. Membership of the said faculty members allows for active participation in framing of the curriculum, in its reviews/revisions, in preparing the reading /reference list recommended by the University as per the curriculum, in reviewing the feedback (if any) received from various Colleges on delivery/transaction/implementation of the curriculum and redressal of related difficulties. Faculty of all departments prepare question banks to facilitate the preparation and learning of students for examinations.

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- (ii) The faculty communicates its feedback to the respective Board of Studies and is advised accordingly.
- (iii) The faculty participate in seminars and workshops on curriculum of respective subjects organized by the University and the affiliating University. Departments organize seminars, workshops to enrich the curriculum in different ways.
- 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

There is a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from postgraduate students on the postgraduate curriculum in Commerce. However, student feedback on undergraduate curriculum has not been obtained so far.

Feedback from students on the P.G. Curriculum in Commerce is carefully analysed by the Department for addressing the specific learning difficulties in order to enrich the curriculum delivery mechanism. Such feedback is also communicated to the University by the faculty member who is a member of the Board of Studies in Commerce.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?

No new programme could be introduced by the institution during the last four years due to space constraint. However, marketing as a combination for B.Com (Honours & General) has been introduced since 2013.

The College submitted a proposal to the University of Calcutta for introducing marketing as another specialization in the P.G. course in Commerce. In response to the proposal, the University of Calcutta enquired whether enough space was available for the new course in the College. As the College is facing space constraint with the already existing courses, due to the sharing of same premises with Netaji Nagar College (evening), it has not been possible to pursue with the proposal.

Any other relevant information regarding Curricular Aspects which the college would like to include.

The institution being an affiliated College of the University of Calcutta follows the University stipulated curricula in all courses offered. Sincere efforts are made by the faculty for effective delivery and transaction of the curricula.

CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1. Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1. How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college publishes notices related to admission on its official website and on the college notice board simultaneously much before the commencement of the admission process. The online admission system is being followed since 2015-16 session in compliance with the directive from the University of Calcutta and the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal. In order to ensure transparency in the admission procedure, the merit lists of applicants are published on the website and on the college notice board. The dates for admission are announced on the institutional website so that the candidates who are willing to get themselves admitted to the institution can avail of the opportunity.

- 2.1.2. Explain in detail the criteria adopted and the process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution .
 - The college strictly follows the University prescribed criteria for admission to various courses. At the time of admission, the merit of the students as reflected in their marks obtained at the previous Board Examination, are taken into consideration. Merit lists are prepared for each of the courses of study offered by the institution. Names of applicants along with the marks secured by them in the Board Examinations are enlisted and displayed on the college website and on the college notice board.
- 2.1.3. Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating University within the city / district.

The college strictly follows the University norms regarding the minimum percentage of marks for admission to the various undergraduate courses offered by the institution. A candidate applying for admission to Honours course must have secured (i) 50% marks in aggregate and 45% marks in subject / related subject, or (ii) 55% marks in the subject / related subject, or (iii) 50% marks in aggregate where the applicant has not studied the subject in the previous examination.

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The minimum and maximum percentage of marks secured at the (10 + 2) Board Examination, by the students admitted to various courses offered by the institution are presented in the following table:

2.1.4. Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The admission process is reviewed in the Admission Sub-Committee meetings held after the first round of admission is over, and again after completion of the admission process. Such review has contributed to the smooth conduct of the whole admission process in subsequent years.

2.1.5. Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase / improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate / reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.

SC / ST: The College strictly adheres to government regulations regarding reservation of seats for SC / ST category (22 % and 6 % respectively).

OBC: The new government regulation for reservation of seats for OBC category (10% for OBC A and 7% for OBC B) has been effective from 2014.

Women: Our College is a co-educational institution and there is no govt. regulation regarding reservation of seats for women. The college however is very serious about making girl students aware of the different aids and grants given by the state government, (Ex: Kanyashree Prakalpa), and also ensuring a congenial atmosphere for women. As a result, the number of girl students is significant.

Differently abled: The rule regarding reservation of seats (3%) for differently abled students is followed by the institution for all courses of studies.

Economically weaker sections: The students from economically weaker sections are allowed tuition fee and lab charge concession.

Minority Community:

Students of the College who belong to the minority community receive Post Matric Scholarship from West Bengal Minority Development and Finance Corporation for pursuing higher studies. The details are given below.

2.1.6. Provide the following details for various programmes offered by the institution during the last four years and comment on the trends i.e. reasons for increase/decrease and actions initiated for improvement.

The demand ratio for UG courses offered by the college is more or less stable in the range of 1:3 to 1:5 in the last four years as shown in the following table. The demand ratio for the post graduate course in Commerce (for which college has academic autonomy from the University) has been 1:2 for most of the years.

The students seeking admission to UG courses and in the PG course in this institution are mainly from the surrounding locality. A significant number of students hail from the economically less privileged section of society. The college ensures maximum access for such students.

2.2. Catering to student diversity

2.2.1. How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The cases of differently abled students are dealt with utmost sympathy, affection and care by both the teachers and the students. While appearing in different university examinations, extra time as per university rule, is allotted to them. The Equal Opportunity Centre takes care of their special needs.

2.2.2. Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes' give details on the process.

Yes. Before the commencement of the teaching programme the students' knowledge, needs and skills are assessed generally on the basis of their performance in the previous final examination at the Higher Secondary level. But occasionally in the past, some departments also conducted written or vivavoce admission tests.

2.2.3. What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge / Remedial / Add – on / Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Students who are unable to cope with the programme of their choice are given special attention by the concerned teachers through remedial classes. The details of remedial classes taken are given in section 2.3.7.

2.2.4. How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion and environment etc?

The overall atmosphere in the college is congenial to gender justice and equality issues. The college is a co-educational institution where male and female students and staff members participate in all activities together sharing a healthy relationship.

Environmental study is an integral part of the UG curriculum of the affiliating University. Final year students have to carry out field study on any one environmental issue from the list prescribed in the syllabus. After the completion of the field work they also have to submit a project report subject to evaluation.

The Science and Nature Club of the college is also actively involved in creating environmental consciousness among the staff and students through various programmes.

Some of the programmes organized by the Science and Nature Club are:

- a) Students' participation in "Kolkata District Student Youth Science Fair, 2014 on 01.09.2014 and 02.09.2014.
- b) Educational tour sponsored by Birla Industrial And Technological Museum, Kolkata to visit BITM and the State Level Science Fair at Netaji Indoor Stadium, Kolkata on 12.09.2014.
- c) Science Exhibition entitled 'Save the Nature Save our Planet Protect the Environment' held in the college on 9th and 10th October, 2015 as a part of College Foundation Day Celebration.
- 2.2.5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners are easily identified by the teachers through regular interaction during classes. Once the advanced learners are identified, the teachers help them with additional reference books and learning materials. They are encouraged to effectively utilise the central library and seminar library under the guidance of concerned teachers and the librarian. Access to on-line books

and journals is ensured by the concerned teachers, through the N-list programme of INFLIBNET for which the College subscribes annually.

2.2.6. How does the institute collect, analyse and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The faculty takes special care of slow learners and those from disadvantaged sections or economically weaker sections. Slow learners are identified through classroom interaction. Teachers of all departments take remedial classes for the slow learners in addition to the regular assigned classes. Students from economically weaker sections are allowed concessions on their tuition fees by the college authority. A significant number of students also receive financial assistance from government through the college:

- i) Govt. of India Post Matric Scholarship for SC/ST/OBC students
- ii) Post Matric Scholarship for minority students from the West Bengal Minority Development Finance Corporation.
- iii) One time financial assistance for girl students under the Kanyashree Parkalpa of Govt. of West Bengal

2.3. Teaching – Learning Process:

2.3.1. How does the college plan and organize the teaching. learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic Calendar, Teaching Plan, Evaluation blue print, etc.)

The college plans and organizes teaching, learning and evaluation schedule in the following ways:

- a. The college adheres to the University stipulated curriculum for teaching students and they learn according to the curriculum and its recommended books. In addition, the teachers are actively engaged in implementing innovative teaching methods, in providing supplementary reading resources and in holding remedial classes.
- b. The college aims to promote a systematic way of learning through the college time table by distributing time proportionately to learning of all elective subjects.
- c. Mid Term and College Test Examinations are conducted by the college in adherence to the academic calendar of the affiliating university. The results of internal examinations are displayed promptly and students are allowed to see their evaluated answer scripts.

- d. The Academic sub-committee holds regular meetings to discuss and resolve issues related to teaching and learning.
- e. At the beginning of each academic session, the heads of all departments hold departmental meetings to chalk out a well framed syllabi distribution for smooth completion of the curriculum with sufficient time for learning and internal assessments.
- 2.3.2. How does the IQAC contribute to improve the teaching learning process?

The IQAC has been functioning since March, 2011. From its inception it has been striving to promote a sound academic atmosphere in the College by encouraging the teachers and students to fulfil the goal of learning. Departmental seminars and workshops are organised catering to the requirements of the students. The IQAC further suggests to the various departments to run departmental libraries and to keep regular contact with the students for all possible academic assistance.

2.3.3. How is the learning made more student centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The learning is made more student centric in the following ways.

- a) Teachers encourage interactive learning by ensuring active participation of students in the classroom during lectures delivered.
- b) Field work and practical classes are held under the close supervision of teachers. These provide ample opportunity for collaborative learning.
- c) On the basis of internal assessments the teachers identify the advanced and the slow learners. Advanced learners are supported with reference materials and additional reading resources and slow learners are provided supplementary support in remedial classes.
- d) The overall teaching strategy adopted is to gradually move from relatively simpler to complex topics or from more familiar to less familiar ones which facilitates better understanding of the lessons on the part of the students.
- 2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The institution seeks to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators by:

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- a) Inspiring learners to make full use of the library as well as to access the internet facility available in the library.
- b) Encouraging students to interact during the class lectures so that all queries in respect of lectures delivered are adequately answered.
- c) Encouraging and guiding the students to take part in extra-curricular activities which bring out the creative potential in performing arts like music, dance and acting.
- d) Instilling a sense of civic responsibility, unprejudiced social vision and universal consciousness in students, through the activities of the Science and Nature Club, NSS units and the various awareness programmes organized in the college. The details are given under 2.2.4, 3.6.4 and 5.3 Activities of the Science and Nature club have already been mentioned in 2.2.4.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching?

The teachers usually follow the chalk & talk method. This traditional method is supplemented by using power point presentations, models, charts, maps, diagrams etc. Efforts are being made to enhance the use of ICT and modern teaching aids for effective learning. The college library is registered under the N-LIST programme of INFLIBNET which gives the faculty access to online journals to keep themselves abreast of the latest development in their field of study.

- 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?
 - i) The departments organize seminars, workshops and special lectures by experts from various disciplines /areas of professional expertise.
 - ii) The college library is equipped with a reference section with adequate number of reference books to enable students and teachers to carry out reference work. The library stock is updated every year through purchase of new books, journals, magazines etc. The N-List programme of INFLIBNET to which the college has subscribed allows access to on-line journals and books, both on-campus and off campus.
 - iii) The college encourages inter-disciplinary learning by organizing UGC sponsored inter-disciplinary seminars and conferences.

- 2.3.7. Detail (process and the number of students/benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?
 - a) In addition to regular classes, remedial classes are held to improve the academic performance of slow learners. The details of students benefitted are given below;

- b) Teachers provide personal, psycho-social support and guidance services to those students who are in need of such support on individual basis.
- c) Govt. service entry level coaching is provided to outgoing and passed out students by utilizing U.G.C. funds received for the purpose. The details are given in section 5.1.9
- d) The Career Counseling Cell organizes seminars / workshops where experts from reputed training institutes are invited to create awareness among students about various career options. The details are given in section 5.1.9.
- 2.3.8. Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty and the efforts made by the institution in this direction are as follows:

- i) To stimulate creative thinking among students some departments make use of models, charts, etc. in teaching and learning.
- ii) Wall magazines are published by individual departments mainly as student initiatives guided by the faculty.

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- iii) The college magazine "Suswan" also serves as an innovative approach by providing students the opportunity to develop their literary skills under the guidance of the faculty.
- iv) Use of audio-visual aids like power point presentation in teaching is adopted by some departments. Efforts are being made to enhance the use of audio visual aids and to encourage use of ICT in teaching.
- v) The faculty members are encouraged to attend Refresher / Orientation courses, Summer Schools etc. which enable them to continuously upgrade their knowledge and innovative teaching skills.
- vi) The college provides funds for organizing departmental seminars and invited lectures by eminent academicians.
- vii) Advanced learners are guided by the faculty to make use of the internet facility in the library for access to e-resources.
- 2.3.9. How are library resources used to augment the teaching learning process?

The college has a Central Library and Departmental (Seminar) Libraries which are well endowed with books relevant to all the courses offered by the institution. Library resources are well organized through use of Library Management Software as detailed under Criterion IV. The college subscribes to N-List programme of INFLIBNET. Hence the faculty has access to on-line journals and books for effective teaching. Students enjoy borrowing facility as well as reading room facility for reference work in the library.

Library resources are augmented every year through funding from the UGC and the institutional annual budgetary allocation. In addition the college library also receives donated books that augment the existing stock further.

2.3.10. Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college remains open for 190-200 days in an academic year. The time enjoyed normally is not a hindrance for the completion of the curriculum within the allotted time frame of the academic calendar. During unavoidable circumstances like electoral exigencies or otherwise, additional classes are held as and when required.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The college monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning through the following measures that are regularly followed:

a) Students of final year submit evaluation of individual teachers (on a stipulated 10-point scale questionnaire) indexing their ability of successful

- delivery and transaction of the curriculum.
- b) The faculty is required to submit annual self appraisal in the format prescribed by the Higher Education Department of the Govt. of West Bengal. This contains details of classes allotted, classes taken, teaching methods adopted etc. The annual self appraisal of the faculty is seriously reviewed by the management and also by subject experts and Govt. nominee before promotion to the next higher scale of pay.

The college submits requisitions to the West Bengal College Service Commission for the appointment of permanent faculty in vacant posts. For the period till such appointment is made, the college recruits Guest Lecturers on college pay. For all such appointments, advertisements are published in leading newspapers. The requisite qualification for applying for faculty position is as per UGC norms. Appointments are made through interview by a duly constituted selection committee. Thus the recruitment of qualified and competent teachers is ensured.

2.4.2. How does the institution cope with the growing demand / scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes / modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

In order to cope with the scarcity of senior faculty to teach new programmes / emerging areas, the following efforts have been made by the college:

- i) Reputed senior academicians invited to deliver lectures on regular basis in the PG course in Commerce and occasionally in UG courses offered by different departments. The list of eminent academicians who visited the College is given in section 3.1.8
- ii) Seminars / workshops are organized on emerging areas of study. A two day UGC sponsored conference on Bioinformatics was organized jointly by the departments of Electronics and Physics in association with the department of Applied Physics, University of Calcutta, on16th & 17th March, 2012 at this college campus.
- iii) The faculty participates in seminars / conferences and faculty upgradation programmes organised in other institutions on modern / emerging areas of study.

Summer / winter schools, workshops, etc.	1

The College is committed to enhance teacher quality by providing all necessary support to the faculty. Leave is granted to faculty for attending refresher courses and faculty up-gradation programmes. The outcome of the institutional policy for upgrading teacher quality has resulted in the completion of doctoral research work by 10 faculty members, completion of M.Phil by 04 faculty members in the post-accreditation period.

b) Faculty Training programmes organized by the institution to empower and enable the use of modern tools and technology for improved teaching-learning.

The College organized a demonstration –cum-training programme for the faculty in May 2013 on the use of modern tools and technology for improved teaching.

A Refresher course for the faculty of Commerce will be organised in collaboration with the Dept. of Commerce, University of Calcutta, in 2016.

• Teaching Learning Method/ Approaches

The faculty is encouraged to supplement the conventional chalk & talk method with Power Point presentations, field visits, excursions, departmental seminars and invited lectures by eminent academicians as far as possible.

• Handling New Curriculum

Workshops are organised by departments for this purpose, e.g. the Department of Commerce Organised a Workshop in 2010 and another in 2013 on B. Com new syllabi.

• Content/Knowledge management

The College so far has not been able to organize any training programme on content/knowledge management.

• Selection, development and use of enrichment materials

No specific training programme for selection, development and use of enrichment materials could be organized so far. However, the faculty provides additional learning resources to students in accordance with their learning abilities.

Assessment

Assessment related training programme is not required as the faculty attend meetings convened by Head Examiners appointed by the University before evaluating answer scripts of University examinations in each academic session. Assessment guidelines are discussed and finalized for ensuring uniformity in evaluation standards in these meetings. For internal assessments, departmental heads hold meetings with respective faculty to discuss and finalize assessment related norms.

• Cross cutting issues

Workshops are organized by the NSS Unit. The Science and Nature club of the college organizes educational tour, science exhibition etc. These programmes are undoubtedly very effective in sensitizing the staff and students on cross cutting issues.

• Audio Visual Aids/ Multimedia

The faculty is familiar with the use of audio-visual aids like the LCD projector and uses the same for power point presentations while teaching. Hence the need to organize training programme on this has not arisen.

OERs

No specific training programme organized by the College so far on OERs.

• Teaching-learning material development, selection and use

No specific training programme organized by the College so far on teaching-learning material development, selection and use.

- c) Percentage of faculty
 - Invited as resource persons in Workshops / Seminars / Conferences organized by external professional agencies.

17% of full time faculty (holding substantive posts) has been invited as resource persons in workshops / seminars / conferences organized by external professional agencies.

• Participated in external workshops / seminars / conferences recognized by national / international professional bodies.

75% of faculty has participated in external workshops / seminars / conferences recognized by national / international professional bodies.

 Presented papers in workshops/seminars/conferences conducted or recognized by professional agencies.

27% of faculty has presented papers in workshops/seminars/conferences conducted or recognized by professional agencies.

2.4.4. What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (e.g.: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

In order to recharge the teaching faculty the College sanctions study leave to teachers who apply for such leave. Teachers have availed of study leave in the final stage of preparation of their doctoral theses. Leave is also granted to teachers for attending Refresher/Orientation courses. Permission is granted to teachers for teaching assignments in other institutions, outside the hours of duty in this institution. At present 03 full time faculty members are attached to other institutions for teaching assignments.

2.4.5. Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.

Awards / recognition for excellence in teaching at the state, national and international level has not been received by the faculty during the last four years.

2.4.6. Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how' is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Students evaluate the teachers through a structured questionnaire. However, evaluation of teachers by external peers has not been introduced so far. The annual self-appraisal of faculty is reviewed by the IQAC Co-ordinator and Chairperson and subsequently by subject experts and Govt. nominee at the time of promotion to the next higher scale of pay.

Every teacher is made aware of his / her strengths and weaknesses as revealed by the feedback from students on a 10-point scale. Teachers themselves are keen on overcoming their weakness, if any, and for building upon their strength, through self-corrective measures.

2.5. Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1. How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

Students are informed about the Examination regulations of the affiliating University through the college prospectus at the time of admission. In the introductory classes, the teachers make the students aware of the details of the evaluation process in internal and University examination in their respective course of study. Newly recruited faculty members become acquainted with the evaluation processes and norms stipulated by the affiliating University through departmental meetings convened by the HoDs, internally, and by attending Examiners' meetings convened by Head Examiners/Co-ordinators before the evaluation of answer scripts of University examinations.

2.5.2. What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The major evaluation reform introduced by the University of Calcutta and adopted by the affiliated colleges in 2010-11 is the (1+1+1) annual system of evaluation where students have to appear in University Examination at the end of each year. The most recent evaluation reform introduced by the University is the system of Supplementary examination for students who fail to clear the Part I / Part II Examination in elective subjects.

The evaluation reforms introduced by the College relate to internal assessment (not included in the final assessment by the University). These reforms vary across departments. For instance, some departments hold MCQ type tests and viva-voce in addition to subjective type tests.

2.5.3. How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

In order to ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms introduced by the University, the college adheres to the academic calendar of the University. Efforts are made by the college to complete the syllabi for all UG courses offered within the scheduled time. Once the internal examinations and evaluation of all the courses are over, the students are allowed to fill in their examination forms for University examinations.

The college also makes its infrastructure and manpower available for holding the University examinations (B.A. / B.Sc. / B.Com Part I, II, III and Part I / II supplementary). A large number of students from two or more colleges are allotted examination centre in this college by the university.

In respect of internal evaluation reforms, these are initiated by individual departments and they are entrusted with the responsibility of implementation of such reforms.

2.5.4. Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

After completion of a few topics the teachers of different departments conduct class tests and assign home work which constitutes the formative assessment. Regular interaction with students during classes also enables teachers to assess their understanding of any topic. Summative assessments are done by holding Mid-term and Test examinations. The college Test is conducted annually after completion of the syllabus and serves to assess the overall level of preparation of the students for the University examinations.

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Formative assessment of student performance through class test/ home assignments have shown a positive impact as slow learners can be identified at this stage. They are provided remedial coaching to help them in improving their performance. Advanced learners are also identified through their good performance in class tests and they are provided with all necessary support and encouragement by the faculty to enhance their performance.

Summative assessment has a positive impact as students get the opportunity to become acquainted with the pattern of University examinations. As the students are given the opportunity to go through their evaluated answer scripts, they get to know their mistakes and can take adequate measures to correct them. This gives them ample scope to improve their performance in the University examinations.

2.5.5. Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightage assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

Students are allowed to see the evaluated answer scripts of all internal assessments. Their queries, if any, related to evaluation are answered by the concerned teachers to the satisfaction of students. This ensures transparency in the evaluation process.

Depending upon the course of study, the weightage assigned for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc, vary. These relate to internal assessment only as the University stipulated syllabi do not explicitly accommodate these aspects of overall development of students.

2.5.6. What are the graduates attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The undergraduate curriculum of the affiliating University in various disciplines incorporates some common graduate attributes such as the knowledge of basic English, any one modern Indian language, Environmental Studies, logical reasoning, quantitative aptitude, etc.

For proficiency in basic English and in modern Indian language, as well as in Environmental Studies, regular classes are held as per time table and according to the syllabus prescribed by the University. The other graduate attributes are normally acquired by students through their exposure to class lectures, internal assessments, departmental seminars, invited lectures, field visits, etc. in their respective course of study. In addition to curriculum based knowledge in their respective disciplines, the students graduating from this institution also develop certain qualities like sense of discipline, integrity and duty towards the society. The college tries to ensure the attainment of these attributes through an overall atmosphere conducive to the development of confidence, competence, creativity and consciousness in students.

2.5.7. What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

After evaluation of answer scripts the same are shown to the students. Their grievances regarding the evaluated answer scripts, if any, are brought to the notice of the teachers. The errors and omissions found in answer scripts are pointed out to these students and the evaluation standards / benchmarks are explained to them, to their satisfaction.

There is a system of review of answer scripts of University examinations when any student applies for it through the college. The right to see one's evaluated answer script of any University examination is also enjoyed by the students who apply for the same.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1. Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes', give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

The college aims at successful transaction and delivery of the curriculum stipulated by the affiliating University in order to ensure effective learning such that students can perform well in the University examinations. The College also strives to nurture skills and aptitude in students graduating from this institution for higher study /employment. The students as well as the faculty members are aware of such stated outcomes which are implicit in the vision and mission of the College. The institutional practices like remedial coaching for slow learners, career counseling sessions and Govt. service Entry level coaching also serve to spread awareness among the staff and students about the stated learning outcomes of the institution.

2.6.2. Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme /course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes /courses offered

The College monitors the academic progress and performance of students through internal assessments in the form of class tests (formative), and Mid-Term and Test examinations (summative) during the three year duration of the undergraduate courses offered. The evaluated answer scripts of all internal assessments are shown to the students. The performance and progress of students is communicated to their parents/guardians through parent-teacher meetings. The internal assessments serve to prepare the students for appearing at University examinations at the end of each academic session. The results/achievements of students in University examinations in all the courses offered by the College are presented in the following table which shows that the performance of students pursuing Honours courses is better than that of students pursuing General courses.

CRITERION II

This is understandable as the students admitted to Honours courses are academically more advanced as revealed by their performance in the 10+ 2 Board examination on basis of which they are selected for admission. Among General courses, performance of students is better in B.Sc followed by B.Com, with B.A. recording the lowest pass percentage among the three streams. The students who secure the lowest marks at the previous Board examination are generally admitted to the B.A.(General) course. Many of these students find it difficult to cope up with the undergraduate curriculum of the University of Calcutta.

2.6.3. How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution are structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes in the following ways:

- a) Classes are held as per the Time table which is drawn up in adherence to the curriculum of different courses stipulated by the affiliating University. It is tailored to suit individual student's learning abilities and requirements. Advanced students and slow learners on being identified are provided both complementary and supplementary support through additional reading resources, remedial classes etc.
- b) Learners are motivated and encouraged for active participation in academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities organized, ranging from their response during class lectures, contributions to departmental Wall magazines and the College magazine, participating in sports and games, cultural programmes, to reaching out to the less privileged in the neighbourhood slum.
- c) The assessment strategies of the institution comprising of formative and summative assessments, serve to ensure that intended learning outcomes are optimally achieved. Such assessments enable the teachers to know the individual learning abilities of students so that the needs of individual learners can be adequately addressed. The students are informed about their performance in all internal assessments and the same is communicated to their parents/guardians through parent-teacher meetings.
- d) Students on the basis of their aptitude and ability are guided by the faculty in their preparatory steps towards competitive examinations or higher studies.

2.6.4. What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered include:

- a) Career Counselling sessions are organized in the College wherein experts from professional institutes are invited to address the students about various career options. Students graduating from the College are provided guidance regarding the job opportunities available to them on the basis of their respective UG courses and also according to their aptitude and ability. The details of the career counselling programmes held in the College in recent years are given in section 5.1.9
- b) Government service Entry Level Coaching has been introduced to facilitate the preparation of students for various Govt. jobs. Final year students and passed out students undergo such coaching in which they are trained for Quantitative aptitude, Logical Reasoning, General Knowledge, Communicative skill, etc. by experts from leading professional institutes.
- c) A short- term Computer Training Course had been organized in the College by the Department of Technical Education, Govt. of West Bengal. It was instrumental in creating basic computer literacy and enhancing employability of students of this institution. The College is planning to revive this computer training course with the support from the Department of Computer Science of this institution.
- 2.6.5. How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Individual departments maintain data of students' performance and learning outcomes based on internal assessments. These data are centrally collected and tabulated by the Examination sub-committee. The results of Mid-Term and Test examinations are displayed on the College Notice Board. Parent-teacher meetings are held to discuss with parents/guardians the performance of their wards, especially for the students who fail to qualify in internal examinations. The College strives to overcome barriers of learning through the following measures:

- a) Special guidance for slow learners by holding remedial classes beyond regular class hours.
- b) Special care by the faculty to make the curriculum simple and more comprehendible to suit the learning abilities of the slow learners.

- c) Providing tuition fee and lab charge concession to students facing difficulty due to low family income.
- d) Addressing the psychological and other needs of students facing such problems.
- 2.6.6. How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The institution monitors the learning outcomes through discussions in departmental meetings, and in meetings of the Academic sub-committee and Teachers' Council, the recommendations of which are subsequently placed before the Governing Body. To ensure the achievement of learning outcomes, the College emphasizes on regular classes, internal assessments, remedial classes, close guidance in field work/ practical classes, etc. The College also makes efforts to keep the parents/guardians informed about the performance of their wards, as far as possible, and thereby seek their co-operation for achieving learning outcomes.

2.6.7. Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Individual teachers and the institution as whole depend assessment/evaluation outcomes for judging student performance and plan accordingly for achieving learning objectives. The regular interaction with students during class lectures and class tests enable the teachers to identify slow and advanced learners in general and also to identify the topics/sub-topics which require further explanation. The subsequent lectures are planned accordingly. Students' performance in University stipulated Mid-Term and College Test examinations enable the teachers to judge their level of preparation for University examinations. The slow learners are then provided supplementary support through remedial classes. The advanced learners are guided by the faculty for excelling in University examinations.

Any other relevant information regarding Teaching - Learning and Evaluation which the college would like to include.

The College has been making efforts to ensure an adequate number of teaching and non-teaching staff for smooth conduct of the teaching - learning process in the institution. For this purpose, the College has to bear a huge financial burden as a large number of Guest faculty and support staff on College pay have been appointed either due to Govt. sanctioned posts remaining vacant or due to lack of sanctioned posts. The appointment of well qualified faculty is ensured by appointing faculty recommended by the West Bengal College Service Commission against Govt. sanctioned posts, and by recruiting temporary faculty

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having UGC prescribed qualification through interview conducted by a duly constituted Selection Committee. The faculty is encouraged to pursue research activity and to participate in faculty upgradation programmes at regular intervals. The College so far has not been able to provide modern teaching aids to all departments individually mainly due to space constraint as the buildings are shared with Netaji Nagar College (evening shift).

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

- 3.1 Promotion of Research
- 3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

Netaji Nagar Day College at present does not have any recognized research centre of Calcutta University or any other institute. However, since many of the teachers have established research credentials, the College has the potential to be a research centre.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

This institution does have a Research Committee to monitor and address the issues of research, particularly in relation to Minor Research Projects sponsored by the UGC. The Research Committee is composed of the Principal as Chairperson and five members from the faculty who have been actively involved in research work.

Some of the recommendations of the committee are as follows –

- a) The Committee has diligently perused Minor Research Project proposals for technical perfection before the proposals were submitted to the UGC for financial assistance. Any flaws in the formulation of the research proposal have been rectified.
- b) The Committee has approached experts in the areas in which the MRP proposals have been submitted regarding suggestions for improvement of the quality of the research proposal.
- 3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes / projects?
 - Autonomy to the principal investigator
 - Timely availability or release of resources
 - Adequate infrastructure and human resources
 - Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers
 - Support in terms of technology and information needs
 - Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities
 - Any other

CRITERION III

The following measures have been taken by the College to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes / projects

- a) The Principal Investigator of any Research Project is afforded as much autonomy as is permissible under the rules and regulations of the funding agency and the University of Calcutta. After the Research Project is approved by the funding agency, and the Principal Investigator informs the college office of his/her project, he/she is allowed to pursue the work independently, without any undue interference whatsoever.
- b) After the funds are received for a Research Project, the Principal Investigator is informed immediately. He / She then applies for the allotted funds, and the amount is released at the earliest so that the research work may begin without any delay.
- c) Since availability of adequate infrastructure in the college is a precondition for the release of funds to the Principal Investigator, the College infrastructure as required / requisitioned by the Principal Investigator is made available to the best possible extent for smooth execution of the project.
- d) The Principal Investigator is given full freedom to pursue his/her research work, so long as regular teaching duties are not hampered.
- e) Internet facility and Wi-Fi is provided free of cost to all teachers, and this is used for research work by several teachers.
- f) The Library is equipped with desktop computers and Broadband connection. Apart from this, all the science departments have computers in their departmental chambers. The library has a large collection of journals and research-oriented books. As such, there is no dearth of technical infrastructure to pursue research work in the college.
- g) Research Committee helps the PI arrange all bills and receipts according to the heads under which funds have been allocated. Audited statement of accounts is submitted to the UGC on time.
- 3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The faculty endeavours to develop scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students as far as possible within the constraints of an undergraduate institution. Science exhibitions are organized in the College with enthusiastic participation from students, the latest being the one on "Save the

nature – Save our planet – Protect the Environment" held in 2015 which received wide attention and acclaim. Students are also taken for visits to scientific institutions of repute like Science City, Birla Industrial and Technological Museum etc to foster a scientific temper among them, and encouraged to participate in Science Quiz, Poster Competitions etc.

3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (Guiding student research, leading Research Projects, engaged in individual/collaborative research activity, etc.

The following may be cited in this regard:-

Sucharita Mitra (Sarkar) (Dept. of Electronics) Joint supervisor of the Ph.D thesis titled An Approach to Develop a Remote Tele-cardiology System for Compression, Transmission and Analysis of ECG signal of Sourav Kumar Mukhopadhyay, Senior Research Associate, Department of Applied Physics, University of Calcutta, awarded in February 2015.

CRITERION III

3.1.6 Give details of workshops/ training programmes/ sensitization programmes conducted/organized by the institution with focus on capacity building in terms of research and imbibing research culture among the staff and students.

Seminar, workshop, or training/sensitization programme has not been organized so far, specifically on research, but in all the seminars that Netaji Nagar Day College has conducted, the resource persons have emphasized the scope and importance of research in the areas that they have chosen to lecture upon.

There is no such provision at present. However, the faculty is warmly encouraged to apply for funding from relevant institutions like UGC, CSIR, ICSSR etc.

3.2.3. What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

At present, students take up research projects only as part of the undergraduate curriculum in subjects such as Commerce, Geography and Environmental Science for which they are not provided funds. However, students receive financial support for such research oriented initiatives as wall magazines or preparing models, posters and charts for science exhibitions etc.

3.2.4. How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavours and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

Different departments of the College have collaborated to organize seminars which has imparted an interdisciplinary aura to research activities. For instance, the UGC-sponsored National Seminar on "Applied Science in Bioinformatics" on 16th and 17th March, 2012 was a collaboration of the Departments of Electronics and Physics.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

The science departments are equipped with laboratory facilities which are utilized for research work as and when required. The computers in different departments, library and in the computer centre are also used for research oriented activity.

The College encourages its staff and students to make use of the infrastructure in the library for research. The latest version of library cataloguing software called KOHA has been specially installed for the purpose. Additionally, the UGC-Network Resource Centre is also an important pillar for research activity in the college. The College subscribes to N-List programme of INFLIBNET which both staff and students make use of for research.

3.3 Research Facilities

3.3.1. What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

Students are encouraged to utilize books and journals in the library, and also the online resources available under the N-list programme of INFLIBNET in the the UGC- Network Resource Centre in the central library. The Science departments are equipped with laboratories where experimental work can be undertaken. The Department of Commerce is equipped with an IT lab. There is a common IT lab equipped with computers and internet facility for use by all departments.

3.3.2. What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

Books, journals and periodicals are purchased on a regular basis in order to keep faculty members abreast of latest research developments in their respective disciplines. Funds received from the UGC and the State government and college funds are utilized for the purpose. Books purchased through MRP grants are preserved in the library as also the monographs produced as a result of MRPs. Desktop and laptop computers are purchased as and when required for use by the faculty and students. A common IT lab equipped with ten desktop computers, one laptop and one LCD projector and internet facility has been set up recently for common use by all departments. The College renews its subscription to the N-List programme of INFLIBNET every year for ensuring continuous access to on-line resources for the faculty and students. The laboratories are also upgraded at regular intervals by purchasing new equipments and through calibration of existing equipments by technical experts.

3.3.3. Has the institution received any special grant or finance from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities? If 'yes', what are the instruments / facilities created during the last four years.

The College so far has not received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities.

The College being an undergraduate institution mainly, students generally do not require research facilities outside the campus

The faculty can access the on-line resources under N-List, off-campus also, through the individual password that have been provided.

The library of Netaji Nagar Day College, housing the UGC-Network Resource Centre, is a knowledge mine for researchers. A large number of books are available in the library, for ready reference, many of which are rare books. The faculty who undertake UGC funded Minor Research Projects deposit the books purchased for their projects in the College library after completion. This further enriches the stock of latest books in various disciplines available in the library. The use of library management software, KOHA, and use of bar-code on books enables researchers to access books easily. The College subscribes annually to the N-List programme of INFLIBNET to ensure the availability of a vast repository of on-line books and journals for researchers.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighbourhood community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

Fostering a network with the neighbourhood and with the community at large has been taken up by the two NSS units of the College. A special camp is held in the neighbouring Khanpur slum every year during which the students get the opportunity to interact with the inmates especially the children. Blood Donation camp is organized by the College every year with the assistance of M.R.Bangur Hospital. A large number of student volunteers donate blood in this camp. Other services like awareness programmes regarding Voter's Right, planting trees in the neighbourhood, etc. are also organized by the NSS units.

3.6.2. What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

There is no need for a separate institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements as it is tracked by the NSS performance of the individual student in different units. Based on the activities of the NSS units the overall contribution of the College in terms of Institutional Social Responsibility may be ascertained. It is a pride for the institution that student volunteers of NSS matter of from this College have been awarded Best Male Volunteer and Best Female Volunteer in 2010-2011- 12, and 11. Female Volunteer 2012-13. Avik Bhattacherjee, a student volunteer of the College has been awarded the West Bengal State NSS Award for 2012-13

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The College solicits stakeholder perception on its overall performance and quality through student feedback as the students are the chief stakeholders of the institution. The perception of parents/guardians on this issue is also sought during the parent-teacher meetings. The IQAC is introducing the system of eliciting stakeholder perception on institutional quality and performance by circulating questionnaires among three groups of stakeholders- members of the management, teaching and non-teaching staff.

3.6.4. How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

The Programme Officers of the two NSS units of the College organize suitable programmes for community outreach, as per the guidelines laid down by the NSS Unit of the University of Calcutta. It is a matter of pride for this College that students from the NSS unit have received the awards of Best Male Volunteer and Best Female Volunteer from the University in 2010-11, 2011-12 and 2012-13. The Best Programme Officer award was received by Dr Pranjal Chakrabarti of this College in 2009-10 and by Sri Tapan Purkait of this College in 2012-13. The College earned the position of Best College in NSS activity in 2010-11. The Special Camp programme of NSS Unit I of this College was adjudged the Best Special Camp programme in 2011-12.

- 3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

Students are especially encouraged, at the beginning of every academic year, to enroll in the two NSS units of the College. The Students' Union plays a leading role in ensuring the participation of students in extension activities. Although the College has no formal NCC unit, Dr. Santanu Ganguly of the Department of English (who is an ex-NCC officer with 11Bengal Battalion NCC), arranges for students to be enrolled in open NCC units such as 1 WB Air Sqn NCC and 4 Tech WB Air Sqn NCC.

The College has been organizing Blood Donation Camp every year since 2011-12. This activity plays a significant role in promoting the participation of students and staff in community outreach activity.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the College to ensure social justice and empower students from underprivileged and vulnerable sections of society?

The College caters to the needs of students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society by providing tuition fee and lab charge concessions to needy students. There is the system of providing Remedial Coaching to students from SC/ST/OBC/minority community free of cost by utilising the funds received for the purpose from the UGC. In order to empower the students from less privileged sections for employment, the Government Service Entry Level Coaching(UGC funded) is provided to them, free of cost.

An Equal Opportunity Centre has been established in the College for ensuring social justice and empowerment of students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society and also for women.

3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized bythe institution, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

Recognizing the fact that mere academic achievements do not define the complete individual, the students are motivated to participate in extension activities, mainly through the NSS. The participants develop a sense of social responsibility and selfless service. They are inspired to reach out to people in distress which in the long run leads to the betterment of society and develops confidence among the students along with a sense of satisfaction of a meaningful contribution to society.

3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participation in its activities?

The College undertakes extension activity in the neighbourhood. The residents of the adopted slum, Khanpur participate wholeheartedly in the programmes undertaken by the NSS units of the College. The Local Councillor who is an exofficio member of the Governing Body of the College helps in facilitating different schemes and extension activities in the neighbourhood, with the involvement of the local community.

One very recent initiative to encourage community participation was undertaken by three departments of the College-Botany, Physiology and Computer Science, which jointly organized a seminar-cum-workshop- "How to Lead a Healthy Life After Sixty" mainly for the aged population of this locality. The participants were provided free check up of blood pressure and random blood sugar. The use of latest technology by the aged in everyday life was also demonstrated.

3.6.9. Give details on the constructive relationships forged (if any) with other institutions of the locality for working on various outreach and extension activities.

A constructive relationship has been created with the Office of the Councillor, Ward 98 (where the college is located). The local Councillor who is an exofficio member of the Governing Body, gives valuable suggestion for implemention of outreach programmes undertaken by the College through the NSS units.

3.6.10 Give details of awards received by the institution for extension activities and/contributions to the social/community development during the last four years.

The College per se has not yet received any award for extension activities, though many awards and accolades have been won by the two NSS units of the College. The Programme Officers of both the NSS units of the College, Pranjal Chakrabarti and Sri Tapan Purkait have been declared Best Programme Officer in 2009-10 and 2012-13 respectively. The College earned the position of Best College in NSS activity in 2010-11. The Special Camp programme of NSS Unit I of this College was adjudged the Best Special Camp programme in 2011-12.

- (iii) advisory functions with Animatrix Multimedia since 2006.

There is no MOU at present with any other institution though the College welcomes and is also on the look-out for such initiatives.

The beneficiaries from the Workshops were the faculty of Commerce of this College as well as of other colleges of Kolkata.

No formal MoU regarding internship/on-the-job training has been established so far with any institution.

The faculty participates in UGC sponsored faculty development and faculty upgradation programmes organized by the Academic Staff College of different Universities.

The Dept. of Commerce of this College has collaborated with the Dept. of Commerce of the University of Calcutta to organize a Refresher Course in Commerce during 2016.

e) Research

Formal MoU regarding research has not been signed with any institution so far by the College.

f) Consultancy

The faculty has been rendering services in their areas of expertise to various institutions, mainly educational, on honorary basis as detailed in 3.5.4. Formal MoUs have not been signed for such services.

g) Extension

The two NSS units of the College works in association with and under the guidelines set by the NSS of the University of Calcutta. For such extension work, the College has linkages with Ward no. 98 of Kolkata Municipal Corporation where the College is located, the local police station, and with the adopted slum in the neighbourhood.

h) Publication

The College partnered with the erstwhile Computer Centre, a registered society, to publish two journals as mentioned in 3.4.2.

i) Student Placement

Formal MoU regarding student placement has not been signed with any institution so far by the College.

No MoU has been signed by the College so far for introducing new courses.

The different Departments of the College have collaborated with other institutions for organizing seminars/workshops/conferences/training programmes/skill development programmes, etc. The details are given under appropriate sections.

3.7.6. Detail on the systemic efforts of the institution in planning, establishing and implementing the initiatives of the linkages/ collaborations.

The College encourages its faculty to develop linkages with other institutions for academic and outreach activities mainly. The IQAC motivates all explore the possibility and to establish linkages for concerned to offering the expertise available with this institution also and attract the expertise available in other institutions. Such initiatives have resulted in a large number of experts from various fields rendering their services to the College in the postgraduate course in Commerce, in career counselling, in Govt. Service Entry level coaching, in awareness programmes, seminars/workshops, extension activities, etc.

Any other relevant information regarding Research, Consultancy and Extension which the college would like to include.

Though a significant number of faculty members are actively involved in research (doctoral/postdoctoral/research projects/research guidance), there is scope for motivating a larger number of faculty members towards research activity which would augment the volume of research publications of faculty. Consultancy provided is of the nature of academic expertise and has been mainly confined to non- educational institutions. Hence revenue generation from consultancy has not been possible. The two NSS units have been very active in organizing a wide range of extension activity and outreach programmes for involving the students in community development work. Such efforts of this institution have been duly recognized and awarded by the University of Calcutta.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

For the creation and enhancement of infrastructure, the institution works through the following bodies –

- a) The Governing Body
- b) The Teachers' Council
- c) The Building Committee
- d) The Finance Committee
- e) The Purchase Committee

Proposals are first submitted by departments or individuals in a prescribed format to the college office. These proposals have to first pass through the Purchase committee, for library/ departmental /office purchases. If concerned with Building and Maintenance, they have to go through the Building Committee. All purchases beyond Rs.30,000/- have to be approved first by the Finance Committee, which, in turn, is approved by the Governing Body, the highest authority. Sometimes the Teachers' Council places general orders after a resolution is accepted in a meeting. The same process is followed in the case of Buildings, except for the fact that estimates are compulsory before any work is done, whether it is through state government or UGC grant, or from the college fund. No building work is carried out without the sanction of the Building and the Finance Committees.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

a) Curricular and co-curricular activities – classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

The main campus of the college has three separate adjacent four storied buildings known as Main Building (MB), New Building (NB) and Computer Center(CC) along with a play ground just few footsteps behind the college buildings where all Athletic Meets and other intra college tournaments are held.

For all curricular and co-curricular activities the following infrastructural facilities are available:

Classrooms

- i. Large (seating capacity 130 each): 03 nos.
- ii. Medium (seating capacity 90 each): 04 nos.
- iii. Smaller (seating capacity 35 each): 07 non.
- Seminar Hall (Seating 200): 01 nos.
- Technology-enabled learning spaces: 02 nos.
- E-Classroom: 03 nos
- Tutorial spaces: no separate rooms earmarked for tutorials.
- Laboratories: 11 (for Geography, Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Physiology, Mathematics, Electronics, Computer Science and Commerce)
- h) Computer Centre: 01

Botanical garden: No space available for garden.

Animal house: Not available

- Adequate instruments and chemicals in the laboratories.
- Adequate sports equipment available for Games and Sports
- Broadband Internet facilities for both teachers and students in the UGC Network Resource Centre as well as in different departments, office, Principal's Room.
- Central library and Seminar libraries.
- b) Extra –curricular activities sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

The following arrangements are available for extracurricular activities:

Sports:

Sports facililties are available in the college. There is a football ground adjacent to the College for outdoor games. For indoor games there are Table Tennis boards, as well as facilities for Carrom, Chess, etc. in both Boys' and Girls' common rooms. The College has an outstanding record of winning trophies and medals in various inter-college sports and games tournaments since 1999 till date (details given under Criteria V).

Auditorium:

The College Seminar Hall, with 200 seating capacity is used for organising seminars / workshops, cultural programmes and various competitions. Special programmes to commemorate College Foundation Day and other days of national significance are held here. There is an auditorium with seating capacity and modern facilities.

Conference Hall:

There is no Conference Hall in the College at present.

Cultural activities:

The college is known for its excellence in cultural activities, including music, dance, drama, mime, debate, extempore speech, and recitation. Students enthusiastically participate in various intra-college and inter-college competitions and often win prizes. However, it must be mentioned that the College has not been able to provide specialised facilities for cultural activities so far. Recently, the Information and Cultural Affairs department of the Govt. Of West Bengal organised Bangla Sangeet Mela programme in Dec.2015 in which college students and teachers performed on a mobile stage with full musical set-up provided by the Govt.

NSS:

There are two NSS units in the college. The NSS units have adequate facilities for conducting regular camps and special camps according to the schedule decided by the NSS unit of the University of Calcutta.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution / campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

The College faces a space constraint as it shares the same premises with Netaji Nagar College. Therefore, all the available space is optimally utilised. The use of the extra space in the corridor outside the Library for keeping the storage almirahs of departments such as History, Political science, Economics, etc. is indicative of optimum utilisation of available space. The capacity of the laboratories is planned according to the student strength and enhanced as far as possible within limited space, when required. The equipments are optimally utilized by the students and staff.

The major facilities developed/augmented during the last four years are as follows:

- 1. Purchase of computers and equipments in 2012-13 involving a cost of Rs. 17,14,389/-, also in 2015-16.
- 2. Installation of CCTV with 12 (twelve) cameras in the Library, for greater security, in 2013-14 at a cost of Rs.1,12,466 /- set up by WEBEL Electronic Communication Systems Ltd.
- **3.** Complete overhauling of electrical lines of New Building in 2014-15 for the IT Lab of Commerce department at a total cost of Rs.3,79,745/-

Existing Facilities:

a) Office

The Office of this college is located on the ground floor of the Main Building (MB). The room is utilized as the administrative block. The Accountants Room and the Principal's chamber are situated in New Building (NB). The College office, Accountant's room and the Principal's room are well equipped with computers with internet connection.

b) Employees' Co-operative

A separate room situated on the 3rd floor of Main Building has been provided to house the office of the Employees' Co-operative.

Main Academic Section

All departments of the humanities stream and the department of Commerce are located in the Main Building. However, the classrooms in both Main and New buildings are utilised for holding the classes of all departments. The departments of the Science stream and their laboratories are located on different floors of the Main building and New Building Due to space constraint, the Post Graduate course in Commerce is run along with the undergraduate courses in the same building.

Library

The Central library comprising of two rooms merged into one large room is located on the first floor of the New Building (NB). Apart from the main book storage area, there is a reading room and the UGC Network Resource Centre equipped with computers having internet connection.

Laboratories

The laboratories of Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Physiology, Computer Science, Electronics are all well equipped in terms of conducting practical classes of their respective undergraduate courses. However, most of the departments face space constraint. The departments of Chemistry and Botany are in a better position with two rooms each. The chemistry department also has a stock room for keeping important laboratory materials.

College Auditorium

Please refer to section 4.1.2

College Canteen –

The Canteen is situated on the top floor of the New Building (NB). It caters to both staff and students.

Cheap Store

The College also has a Cheap Store which sells books and stationery at prices less than the market price to students. As many students of the College are financially underprivileged, the Cheap Store is very popular among students.

Safe drinking water

There is provision for safe drinking water for the students and staff. Water purifiers are placed in different parts of the College

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

There is no special infrastructural facility so far for students with physical disabilities, and human help is provided as far as possible. For students with orthopaedic disabilities, classes are arranged as far as possible on the ground floor. The library has Braille books for the visually challenged teacher and students.

There is no residential facility for the teachers, staff and students and therefore the following provisions are not available.

- 4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

On campus- No health facility is available within the campus at present. In times of emergency, students and staff are immediately moved to the nearest hospital. During University examinations, a registered medical practitioner of the locality is engaged to take care of any case of sudden illness of examinees.

Off campus- Students may avail of subsidized medical treatment in the Students' Health Home (run by the state govt.) to which the College subscribes annually.

The staff may avail of medical facility under the ESI scheme of the Govt. subject to the ceiling in terms of their salary.

4.1.7. Give details of the Common Facilities available on the campus –spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counselling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.

The Common Facilities available on the Campus are as follows –

i) IQAC:

The IQAC functions from a room located on the first floor of the Computer Centre Building. It is equipped with a computer with internet, an all-in-one printer and a steel almirah.

ii) Women's Cell:

There is no Women's Cell at present.

iii) Counselling and Career Guidance:

No separate space could be allotted to this Cell. The programmes are organized in the Seminar Hall

Recreation for Students

The students have two common rooms, one for the boys and the other for girls. Facilities for indoor games like Table Tennis, Carrom, etc. are available in the Common rooms. Outdoor games like cricket and football are played on the College ground. Students also have access to the internet in the UGC Network Resource Centre in the Central Library.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

The Library Advisory Committee has existed for the last thirty years. It is one of the committees constituted by the Governing Body of the College, and is headed by the Librarian as Convenor and Principal/Teacher-in-Charge as Chairperson. There are seven to eight teachers in this committee to advise and assist the Librarian. The Library Clerk and Library attendant are also members of this committee. The General Secretary of the Students' Union is an Ex-officio member of this Committee. At present the Library Advisory Committee has the following structure.



1) The Stack Room of the Library

The book display area of the library comprises half of the total area of the Library, in which the users are allowed to access the books freely i.e. open access.

2) The Reading Room

The Reading Room is one-third of the total area which is divided into the staff section and the students' section. The students' section has a seating capacity of 80(eighty) while that of the staff section is about 06. The Reading Room has a calm and quiet atmosphere conducive to serious study as well as relaxed reading.

3) The UGC-Network Resource Centre

The *UGC-Network Resource Centre* housed in the Library has five computers out of which four are equipped with internet facility for the use of students and staff. It is an integral part of the reading room of the staff, well suited for reference work on the Internet.

4) Display and Notice Boards

There are two notice boards in the Library, one placed on the right side of the entrance to the Library and the other on the left side of the entrance to the Librarian's chamber. There is also a display almirah for newly procured books and journals.

5) CCTV

The Library has a CCTV with 12 (twelve) cameras for ensuring security.

4.2.3 How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, print and e-journals and other reading materials? Specify the amount spent on procuring new books, journals and e-resources during the last four years.

The Library ensures purchase of reading materials by seeking recommendations from the faculty members of all departments. More emphasis is given for procuring books suited to the curriculum based needs of the students. Suggestions from the non-teaching staff members including the Library staff are also considered while purchasing reading materials. All purchases are done by the Librarian from renowned publishers and booksellers.

The amount spent on procuring new books, journals and e-resources during the last four years is given in the following table.

The Library staff members are always accessible, and are always ready to assist the faculty and students in finding necessary books and study material. They also provide guidance for study material related to different subjects. There is open access system for both staff and students, and the library staff not only help them access books in different parts of the library, but also help the faculty to compile reading lists on the basis of books available in the library.

The staff also prepare bibliography on specific subjects and topics according to the requirements of users. Reading lists are prepared for the students to help them in their preparation for examinations. The library staff also update teachers from time to time about books that are in high demand among the students, so that requisitions for these books may be sent on time.

4.2.8 What are the special facilities offered by the library to the visually / Physically challenged persons? give details.

Some Braille books are available in the library for visually challenged persons. Special attention is paid by the Library staff to the needs of the visually challenged persons(one teacher and two students as well as one physically challenged student at present) so that they do not face any problem regarding book issue and return and other services in the library. The Librarian personally provides e-delivery services to the visually /physically challenged persons.

4.2.9 Does the library get the feedback from its users ? If yes, how is it Analysed and used for improving the library services. (What strategies — are deployed by the library to collect feedback from users ? How is the feedback analysed and used for further improvement of the library services?)

Yes, feedback is regularly obtained from students, teachers, and other staff of the college mainly through discussion about library services. The questionnaire used for collecting feedback on various aspects of the College includes questions on library services. Students regularly give their opinion in the demand copy regarding the new book purchase, internet etc. The feedback received is discussed in the Library Advisory Committee, and decisions and resolutions are taken accordingly. Corrective measures are taken to upgrade the library services and make it more user-friendly.

Internet facility is available throughout the campus, and in many of the computers of the various departments. There is a separate BSNL Internet connection for the UGC Network Resource Centre in the Library for the use of students and 4 four computers linked with it. Another BSNL Internet connection is available in the library for the automation of the library and OPAC & repository search, with five computers linked with it. LAN and WiFi facilities are also available in these five computers. Separate Broadband internet connection (NMEICT) line is there for the Principal's Office, Accounts Section, as well as for the departments of Geography, Physics, Electronics, Mathematics, Computer Science, and Commerce.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

Over the last five years the IT facilities in the campus have been upgraded, particularly because all links with the state government, the affiliating university, and the UGC have become online. More than half of the computers have been purchased over the last five years. The campus has been Internet-

linked, too, in the last three years. IT infrastructure has been given priority in proposals sent to the UGC and the State Government.

- 4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?

The following steps have been taken to facilitate extensive use of ICT resources

- a) The Library has an Internet Centre for the use of students, teachers and staff.
- b) A Basic Computer Course was conducted in the college by the Computer Centre at a minimum cost for the general body of students.
- c) The departments of Geography, Commerce and Mathematics have specialized software for their use.
- d) The Accounts department uses Tally software.
- e) The Library runs on specialized software-KOHA, an open source Library Management Software.
- f) Student admission has become totally online from 2015.
- g) There is both in-campus and off-campus access to e-resources under the N-List programme of INFLIBNET to which the College has subscribed.
- 4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

After the campus has become Internet-enabled, teaching and learning with eresources has become more accessible to both teachers and students. Students are encouraged to use the Internet in their self-study hours.

The Computer course organized by our computer centre for the general body of students at minimum cost has also helped them to make use of latest technology and e-resources as learning aids. Many of these students come from a rural

background, and did not have any computer knowledge before coming to college.

4.3.7 Does the Institution avail of the National Knowledge Network connectivity directly or through the affiliating university? If so, what are the services availed of?

This network has not been availed of till now.

4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities

4.4.1 How does the institution ensure optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of the following facilities (substantiate your statements by providing details of budget allocated during last four years)?

The institution is 58 years old and as such proper maintenance and upkeep of infrastructure and facilities on the campus involves huge cost which has been a major constraint faced by the institution. Besides, the fact that two colleges are run on the same campus (day college and evening college) puts additional load on the available infrastructure. Proper maintenance of infrastructure requires good co-ordination between the two colleges. The Planning & Development Committee constituted by the Governing Body and the Building Maintenance Committee formed by the Teachers' Council assist the Principal in taking decisions regarding maintenance of facilities for keeping all facilities in working condition.

a. Building

There are only two multi-storied buildings connected to each other in the college. The Building Committee of the college oversees the maintenance of these buildings. There is also a Building Maintenance Committee formed by the Teachers' Council, which reports on the condition of the buildings, the electrical wiring, the pipe lines, and the cleaning of the buildings from time to time. Accordingly, necessary steps are taken. The maintenance work has been done from the college fund. Small amounts of funds have also been received by the college from the UGC and the State Govt. for Building Maintenance. In the session 2014-15 the Main building was repaired by the PWD, Govt. of West Bengal for which the College did not have to bear any cost.

b. Furniture

The furniture is repaired as and when required and new furniture is procured whenever necessary. For example, in the year 2014-15 more than **** have been spent for the repairing of old furniture, apart from the cost of purchasing new furniture.

c. Equipment

The responsibility of maintaining equipments is borne mainly by the lab-based departments and by the college office. The technical staff attached to various departments take proper care to ensure that all equipments are kept clean and in working condition. The services of technicians are hired as and when necessary, especially before the commencement of practical examinations. Adequate allocation for purchase and maintenance of equipments is made in the annual budget. A considerable amount of funds are spent for maintenance of equipments in each academic session.

d. Computers

All the computers in the College are under constant maintenance and upgradation. The technical staff attached to the department of Computer Science is entrusted with the overall responsibility of maintenance of all the computers in the institution. The services of external technicians are requisitioned whenever necessary. Adequate allocation for purchase of new computers and maintenance/ upgradation of existing computers is made in the annual budget every year.

e. Vehicles

The college has no vehicle.

f. Any other

The college has a large football ground which has to be kept free of weeds and unwanted growth such that it is in proper condition for playing football, cricket and other sports and games. The cost involved is shared by the three colleges (Netaji Nagar College, Netaji Nagar College for Women).

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The following committees work to maintain the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college –

a) The Building Committee (constituted by the Governing Body)

- b) The Finance Committee (which allots funds for maintenance; constituted by the GB)
- c) The Purchase Committee (which oversees the items to be purchased, and ensures that the purchase is made as per norms.
- d) The Building Maintenance Committee (constituted by the Teachers' Council, and which assists the Building Committee in identifying the problems in the infrastructure)
- e) The various departments, which maintain their infrastructure, and also report on the condition of their equipment.
- f) The general awareness created among the staff and students that the campus is for them and that they should make all efforts to keep it in good condition.
- 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

The laboratory equipments/instruments are usually checked for precision before the commencement of University examinations in each academic session. Besides, there are laboratory attendants for all lab-based departments for the regular maintenance of equipments/instruments.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The following methods are used for these aspects –

a) Electricity:

There is an Electrician-cum-Caretaker among the full-time staff of the college, and an electrician among the college payee staff who undertake regular electrical maintenance work. Minor electrical repairs are done as and when needed. A complete overhauling of electrical lines of New Building has been done in 2015 at a total cost of Rs.3,79,745/-

b) Water:

The supply of water from the Kolkata Municipal Corporation is usually adequate for ensuring constant supply of water in the College premises. There is a big reservoir beside the main gate of the college to store Corporation supplied water. A pump of 3HP capacity is used for lifting the water to the overhead reservoirs from where it is supplied to all parts of the two buildings. There is pump man among the full-time staff of the college.

Any other relevant information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources which the College would like to include:

The College faces space constraint. The available space and infrastructure is optimally utilised for teaching, learning, research, co-curricular, extra-curricular, extension and administrative activities. Efforts are made to augment and maintain the available infrastructure and learning resources by utilising grants received from the UGC and the state government as well as from internal resources.

The mission of the College is to impart value based education to students hailing from all sections of the society irrespective of caste, creed and financial status. The institution works through various committees /sub-committees comprising of faculty members, non-teaching staff and student representatives. All departments, sub-committees and the IQAC always keep track of the facilities to be offered to the students as per commitment in the prospectus. Records of academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are maintained with great care and such activities are periodically reviewed. The opinion of parents/guardians as obtained from parent-teacher meetings, student feedback and review of the functions of different committees/sub-committees etc. are seriously taken into consideration by the authority to ensure the commitment and accountability of the institution.

5.1.2 Specify the type, number and amount of institutional scholarships /Free-ships given to the students during the last four years and whether the financial aid was available and disbursed on time?

The College makes provision in its annual budget for institutional scholarships/freeships for the underprivileged students on need-cum-merit basis. The selection for such free-ships are solely decided by the college administration after scrutinizing the applications received at the beginning of each academic session. The financial aid is made available and always disbursed to the students on time. The details of such institutional free ships are given below:

In the year 2013, the Govt. of West Bengal introduced a one-time financial assistance of Rs. 25000/- for needy, single girl-child under the 'Kanyashree Prakalpa'. From Netaji Nagar Day College college, 10 students, have been selected by the Government of West Bengal for "Kanyashree" stipend out of 67 candidates applied for the same in 2013-14.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for

• Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

The college reserves seats at the time of admission for SC/ST/OBC candidates as per existing government rules. Reservation for OBC candidates was introduced in the year 2013 as per circular of Government of West Bengal. Moreover, post- matric fellowships for the said students are also processed and disbursed in time. For economically backward students, the college provides financial assistance in the form of free-ships by waiving their tuition fee and /or laboratory fee. Remedial coaching (UGC funded) is provided to them beyond College hours free of cost. Government service Entry Level Coaching is also made available to these students free of cost with financial assistance received from the UGC.

• Students with physical disabilities

Seats are kept reserved for physically challenged students as per Government rules at the time of admission. A few physically challenged students take admission in this college. The College authority and faculty members take special care of these students throughout the year. Outside class room teaching concerned teachers arrange special/extra classes for them, whenever necessary. During examinations physically challenged candidates are provided necessary facilities as per University rules. The College library has

some Braille books for visually challenged students.

Overseas students

Some students from the neighbouring country of Bangladesh take admission in this College in almost every academic session. The College authority provides them the necessary support in terms of identity verification and other formalities which are now quite stringent as per rules of the Bangladesh High Commission. The overall atmosphere in the College is conducive to make these students feel at ease. The faculty, non-teaching staff and Students' Union extend all cooperation to overseas students.

Students to participate in various competitions/National and International

A significant number of students from this college participate in sports and games, and in co-curricular and cultural events at the Inter-College, University and State levels. Several awards have been won by them in such events. The College organizes various sports events, cultural programmes like dancing, singing, drama, quiz, debate etc. where some of the faculty members sincerely train participants for exploring their talent. The details of such events are given in 5.3.1 and 5.3.2. The College bears the expenses necessary for students to participate in internal and external events. Tuition fee concessions are provided to outstanding sportsmen. Sportswear and sports shoes are also provided to players representing the College.

• Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.

Due to space constraint the college has no health centre yet, but the proposal for a separate room for medical emergency has been tabled recently. The Students' Union room is always provided with arrangements for First-Aid in case of emergency. A health insurance policy of Rs 10,000/- for each student admitted in this college is maintained by the authority with a nominal amount of Rs 10/- per student received at the time of admission. In case of ailment of a student during his/her bonafide studentship, this policy proves helpful. In case of medical emergency of any student, the authority promptly acts to the need of the situation and immediately he/she is taken to the nearest Government hospital. During University examinations, a local medical practitioner is available for dealing with any medical emergency.

• Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

The college organizes coaching for its final year and passed out students for Government Service Entry Level Examinations like WBCS, SSC etc. Experts from professional institutes are invited to deliver lectures for this programme. The details are discussed in 5.1.7. The course is funded by the UGC. Students from disadvantaged sections can avail such coaching free of cost while students from General Category have to pay a nominal fee. A Career Counselling & Placement cell functions for providing career guidance to the students regarding various job opportunities. The details are given in 5.1.9.

• Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

The majority of students of this college come from schools with Bengali as medium of instruction. Hence they face a language problem during their early stage of pursuing Honours courses particularly in Science subjects. However, concerned teachers render all possible guidance to help them overcome this language problem. The students of Science and Commerce streams are familiar with computer application in accordance with the academic curriculum of University of Calcutta. The College is planning to introduce a computer training course for all students very shortly as a similar course of the Dept. of Science & Technology of the state govt. conducted by the Computer Centre of the College has been discontinued by the said Dept.

• Support for "slow learners"

The college provides Remedial Coaching for the 'slow learners' who are mainly from underprivileged class, free of cost, although students belonging to general category can attend the classes with nominal course fee. The classes are taken by the in-house faculty members beyond scheduled College hours. Financial support for this course is provided by the UGC. The faculty also makes itself available for slow learners as and when required, beyond all scheduled classes.

 Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/corporate/business house etc.

Different departments of the College arrange seminars/workshops during which the presentations by eminent academicians from various disciplines provide exposure to newer ideas of higher learning and motivate the students to opt for higher studies. Except the Department of Commerce which runs regular PG course, the college is mainly an undergraduate institution offering basic subjects of Science and Humanities. Since the courses offered by this institution do not encompass applied fields, provisions for exposure of our students to corporate and business house are limited. Nevertheless, some students participate in various science related programmes (please see 5.3.2) in other institutions every year.

Publication of student magazines.

The college publishes a college magazine named "SUSWAN" (Sweet Sound) where students of different departments contribute. The Editorial Board of the magazine comprises of members of the Magazine Sub-committee and a student representative. The College magazine is the ideal media for the students to exhibit their literary and creative talents, featuring poems, short stories, sketches and other items of general interest. Geography department publishes the Wall magazine named "Basundhara" regularly. Zoology department also brings out Wall magazine entitled "The Life".

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

The UG level courses offered by this college are mainly based on basic subjects of science and arts. The only PG course run by this college is M.Com. Consequently developing entrepreneurial skills among the students of this institute are very limited.

- 5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities such, as Sports, Games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.

The students of this college are encouraged for their co-curricular and extracurricular activities through the policies adopted and facilities offered by the institution. Students are actively encouraged and supported by their respective departments to participate in various academic, cultural and co-curricular activities. The Students' Union plays a very active role in promoting student participation in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities. The financial resource needed to organize such activities is provided by the college. Students' participation is ensured by

- i. Organizing inter-departmental indoor and outdoor sporting events.
- ii. Providing sports equipments to students actively involved in sports.
- iii. Providing financial assistance in the form of TA etc to students for participating in different sports activities as well as cultural and academic activities like attending seminars and science exhibitions organised by other institutions.
- iv. Organising various cultural activities round the year such as Intra-College competitions in different categories like singing, recitation, dancing, painting etc..
- 5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR- NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE / CAT / GRE / TOFEL / GMAT / Central /State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

A coaching centre funded by the UGC has been formally set up to prepare final

year students for competitive examinations for various Government jobs like WBCS, SSC etc. Eminent experts regularly come to our college for this course resource persons. Although this course is free for underprivileged students of all streams, general category candidates can also attend the classes by paying a nominal fee. Ex-students of the home institution along with students from other colleges in the locality can take part in these job-oriented courses by paying a nominal fee.

5.1.8 What type of counseling service are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

• Academic Counseling:

as

Academic counseling is provided to the students all through their three year tenure in the college in order to make them familiar with the academic curriculum of the University. Teachers are always available in addition to their allotted classes, for helping the students either individually or in small groups for preparing them for University examinations as well as other competitive examinations. Faculty members pay special attention to the advanced students so that they can pursue higher studies in their field of interest. The College also arranges remedial classes for slow learners in addition to the scheduled classes given in the college time table.

• Personal Counseling:

Personal counseling is undertaken by teachers as and when required through interaction on one-to-one basis. Teachers regularly interact with individual students to help them to cope with stress or personal problems and provide them support in various forms so that they can continue their studies with confidence.

• <u>Career Counseling:</u>

The college has a Career Counseling Cell which motivates the students towards pursuing career options of their choice and to offer guidance regarding preparation for competitive job- oriented examinations etc.. For this purpose the cell organizes seminars on career related issues, and makes arrangements for campus interviews. For details, please see 5.1.9.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'yes', detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programmers).

There exists a Career Counseling and Placement Cell in the college which functions throughout the year for the benefit of students in respect of their employability. The cell is committed to provide students with more and more opportunities for jobs and in this respect this body is constantly trying to communicate with various companies for campus selections.

The Cell has organized several discussion-cum-lecture programmes and a number of seminars in the campus for career guidance. The lectures are delivered mainly by some eminent speakers in their respective field of study.

We would like to mention, here, that five students of our college were selected for jobs in S2C Network Pvt. Ltd. in a campus interview held in 2013.

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

Yes, the college has a Grievance Cell. A Grievance Redressal box has been placed at a convenient location for the students to drop their complaints. Students' Union very actively and sincerely take up such instances and immediately bring those complaints to the notice of the authority. Grievances are promptly resolved. No formal complaint has been received till date.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

A Cell has been constituted to deal with issues pertaining to sexual harassment, if any, according to the Vishakha Guidelines of the Supreme Court. However, no such incident has taken place so far in this institution.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been

reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

The college has an anti-ragging cell and it is clearly stated in the prospectus that any form of ragging within the college premises is strictly prohibited as per UGC guidelines. If any such complaint is lodged, the authority is bound to take necessary steps immediately. However, no such complaint has yet been registered.

5.1.13 Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution

The following welfare schemes have been made available to the students:

- i. Tuitions fee and lab charge concession is provided to the economically less privileged students. The disadvantaged section of students also receive scholarship from the Govt. The details are given in 5.1.3 and 5.1.4
- ii. Career guidance is provided to the students graduating from this college.
- iii. Govt. Service Entry Level coaching funded by UGC is also provided to the final year and passed out students.
- iv. Remedial coaching for slow learners is provided by the college with financial assistance from UGC.
- v. The amount collected from students for students' relief fund is promptly disbursed among students facing serious financial crisis in every academic session.
- 5.1.14 Does the institution have a registered Alumni Association? If 'yes', what are its activities and major contributions for institutional, academic and infrastructure development?

An Alumni Association exists in the college. This Association has not yet reached such maturity as to contribute significantly for institutional development.

The college is committed to bring down the failure and drop-out rate of the students. Special care is taken for students who are at the risk of failure by providing them with special tutorial facilities in addition to regular classes as per time-table of the college. Parent-teacher meetings are held to appraise the parents about their wards' performance and attendance in the college. The college authority provides financial support to those students who are at the risk of discontinuing studies due to poor financial condition. The welfare provisions such as tuition fee concessions also encourage the students to pursue their course of study. 5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback front its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

Feedback forms are filled up by the students for obtaining their responses to institutional provisions and the teaching faculty separately. Structured questionnaires are used for this purpose. Student feedback is obtained on a ten – point scale. Such feedback is analyzed by the IQAC and appropriate measures are undertaken for improvement.

5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine and other material? List the publications/materials brought out by the students during previous four academic sessions.

In the year 2012, the College magazine named "SUSWAN" (Sweet Sound) contained 28 contributions from the students out of a total of 44 contributions.

In the year 2014, there were 17 contributions from the students out of a total of 32 contributions in "SUSWAN".

The College in association with Netaji Nagar Day College Computer Center also publishes two journals, "COMSOMATH" and "International Journal of Information and Computing Science". The details are given under Criterion-III.

The department of Geography brings out a wall magazine entitled "BASUNDHARA" every year which gives vent to the writing skill of students.

The department of Zoology publishes a wall magazine entitled "The Life". Different forms of life are covered in this issue from simple organism Daphnia to complex organism like Parrot Fish. Social awareness is another part of this small effort as the articles throw light on topics like Test Tube baby or Skin Cancer.

The Career Counseling Cell also published a booklet containing information about higher studies in different subjects as well as about job opportunities in govt. and private sectors.

5.3.5 Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

Yes, the college has a Students' Union which is formed in compliance with the Calcutta University First Statutes 1979. The Students Union is an elected body comprising of student representatives elected through democratic election procedures every year. Class representatives are elected by students of the corresponding classes who cast their votes through secret ballot. The General Secretary is selected by the elected class representatives by consensus.

Throughout the year the Students' Union cooperates with the college

administration for running the institution smoothly. The Union is actively involved in organizing sports events, cultural programmes and outreach activities like Blood donation camps etc.

The fund for Students' Union is collected from the students under appropriate head during admission. A separate bank account is maintained for the same with the President and the General Secretary of the Students' Union as the signatories. On special occasion the Students' Union obtains sponsorship for its activities.

5.3.6 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

The General Secretary of Students' Union and other student representatives are members of various academic and administrative bodies such as the Governing Body, Academic Sub-Committee, Sports and Welfare Sub-Committee, Magazine Sub-Committee , Cultural Sub-Committee etc.

5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the Institution?

The College maintains contact with alumni and former faculty mainly through initiatives taken by the departments. The Alumni Association has not yet attained maturity. Nevertheless it extends a helping hand for establishing contacts with passed out students and former faculty as far as possible.

Any other relevant information regarding Student Support and Progression which the college would like to include.

The College has been following the policy of widening the access to higher education for students from diverse socio-economic and educational background. As a result the institution has a significant section of students hailing from the

disadvantaged strata of society. The College has been making efforts to strengthen the student support systems within its available resources. The students excel in sports and games and are also involved in wide ranging extension activity through the NSS units of the College. Their academic performance is also satisfactory as the institutional pass percentage in University examinations has surpassed the overall pass percentage of the University in almost all years.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

The vision and mission of Netaji Nagar Day College are as follows:

Vision:

To be a leading College in Kolkata, providing a well-resourced strongly academic, holistic education to boys and girls in such a way that it will create an environment, "Where the mind is without fear, the head is held high and knowledge is free".

Mission:

- i) To offer equal opportunity of access to all.
- ii) A differentiated approach to teaching that encourages all students to participate fully in the process of learning.
- iii) To encourage and motivate students to achieve their full potential whilst recognizing and commenting their efforts, achievements and success.
- iv) To provide a safe and caring environment that will promote close relations between the three sections of the academic community Students, Teachers and Non-teaching employees.
- v) To provide a value based system of education such that students will participate in all co-curricular activities which will improve their health and mind and also encourage them to participate in welfare activities having 'Community Orientation'.

The College has grown out of the passion for higher education among the local people who settled in this area after being displaced from their original roots in erstwhile East Pakistan. Hence the commitment to provide maximum access to students from diverse socio-economic background while ensuring that economic condition does not become a barrier for those really aspiring for higher education. The institution endeavours to fulfil its role in society by striving for the empowerment of youth by imparting education that will not only nurture skills essential for employment but also inculcate values as responsible citizens.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The topmost tier of management is the Governing Body of the College constituted according to Statute 93 of the University of Calcutta. The Governing Body has a democratic structure comprising of an elected President, Secretary (Principal), two representatives from University of Calcutta, two representatives from the Government of West Bengal, the local Councillor, four teacher representatives, two representatives from non-teaching staff and one student representative. Meetings of the Governing Body are held at regular intervals and all policy decisions on academic/administrative matters are made therein. The Principal as the academic and administrative head of the institution implements the policy decisions in consultation with the faculty and staff by holding meetings of concerned sub-committees and delegating responsibilities.

- 6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring :
 - The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission

Policy decisions and action plans are formulated by the Governing Body keeping in view the need to fulfill the stated mission. Tuition fee concessions are granted to the economically less privileged students. Financial resources are provided by the College for all student activities- co-curricular and extracurricular. The Principal as the head of the non-teaching employees in all activities in order to promote close relations between these three groups of primary stakeholders.

 Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

All operations are allocated to the various sub-committees consisting of teaching, non-teaching and student members with each sub-committee headed by a Convener. The sub-committees hold meetings before undertaking various activities. Such meetings are chaired by the Principal whose guidance ensures proper co-ordination of all operations for the implementation of the institutional strategic plan.

Interaction with stakeholders

The Principal as the academic and administrative head of the institution interacts regularly with the teaching, non-teaching staff and students through formal meetings as well as informally. These three groups of primary stakeholders feel free to approach the institutional head on all matters,

institutional and personal. The parents/guardians can also meet the Principal on all working days if they so desire.

• Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

Prior to the formulation of policy and planning, the actual needs of the institution are identified by the leadership through consultations with teaching and non-teaching staff and student representatives. The opinion of parents/guardians as revealed during parent-teacher meetings is also taken into consideration.

• Reinforcing the culture of excellence

The leadership provides constant encouragement and sanctions financial resources necessary for organizing co-curricular and extracurricular activities for ensuring all round development of students. Remedial coaching and Govt. Service Entry-level Coaching are held by utilizing funds received from the UGC for providing additional support to students for better performance in academic and professional pursuits. Efforts for academic excellence have been successful to some extent as a number of students secure first class marks in University examinations every year in various disciplines. The College has to its credit University topper in B.Sc. Geography Honours in the year 2014.

• Champion organizational change

Organizational changes for betterment are brought about through resolutions adopted unanimously in the Governing Body meetings. Proposals for changes are initiated in the meetings of the Teachers' Council, Academic Sub-Committee or Finance Sub-Committee. Meetings are held with concerned sub-committees before implementing such changes.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

To ensure effective implementation of policies and plans framed in the meetings of the Governing Body, the status of such policy/plan is reviewed during confirmation of resolutions in the subsequent meetings. All aspects related to implementation of policies/plans are reported to the Governing Body by the Principal. Similarly, the decisions made in the Governing Body arecommunicated to the teaching and non-teaching staff by the Principal through meetings of the various sub-committees and of the Teachers' Council.

The IQAC also plays an important role in monitoring and evaluating the implementation of policies and plans for improvement.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The meetings of the Academic Sub-Committee comprising of all heads of departments are chaired by the Principal and the resolutions adopted therein are placed before the Governing Body for approval. The Principal is directly involved in all academic activities and supervises the preparation of time table, allotment of classes to faculty, holding of internal and University examinations, evaluation of answer scripts, etc. The faculty is encouraged by the leadership's liberal policy of granting permission and leave required to participate in faculty upgradation programmes for academic improvement.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The teaching and non-teaching staff and student representatives as members of various sub-committees are given responsibilities for different activities of the institution. Such delegation of authority and participative management is very effective for grooming leadership quality at various levels. The elected student representative in the Governing Body gets the opportunity to participate in the institutional decision making process. The Students' Union as a whole is given the responsibility to organize various programmes like the Annual Sports, cultural events, felicitations, extension activities such as Blood Donation Camp, etc. This helps to nurture leadership quality among the office bearers and members of the Students' Union. The students in general are groomed in leadership through their participation in organizing departmental seminars, preparing Wall magazines, field study and excursions, etc.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The College office, Library, Departments, NSS unit, and the Students' Union are the different units of the institution, all of which are provided operational autonomy. For running the Office, authority is delegated to the Head Assistant who allocates work to the Group C and Group D employees. The Librarian is entrusted with the responsibility of running the Library with the help of Library staff. The Heads of Departments are in charge of their individual departments and take decisions in consultation with the concerned faculty. The two NSS units are each run by a Programme Officer. The Students' Union works through an elected General Secretary and other Office Bearers. Though authority is delegated to the different units of the institution, the Principal maintains close contact with all the units to ensure co-ordination between them for the sake of good governance.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, the College promotes a culture of participative management at various levels. At the topmost level is the Governing Body in which external members as representatives of the University, State Govt., the local authority, and internal members as representatives of the teaching, non-teaching staff and students participate in the management of the institution.

The teachers as members of the Teachers' Council, a statutory body, participate in discussions related to various institutional aspects and adopt resolutions which are subsequently placed before the Governing Body for approval. The teaching and non-teaching staff and students participate in the management of the institution through the working of different sub-committees of which they are members.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The College is committed to a gradual process of quality enhancement though all that is desired cannot be achieved in the short run due to several constraints. The Governing Body as the policy making authority formulates policies in tune with the vision and mission of the College. Such policies are implemented through the statutory bodies such as the Teachers' Council, Finance Sub-Committee, etc. as well as through various sub-committees constituted by the Teachers' Council, under the overall guidance and supervision of the Principal. Review of policy and its implementation is entrusted to the Internal Quality Assurance Cell which makes recommendations to the Governing Body.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects

considered for inclusion in the plan.

The College has been planning to construct a new building on the land owned jointly with Netaji Nagar College as the space constraint has been the major hindrance for development. To this effect resolutions have been adopted in Coordination Committee meeting (Joint Committee of the two Colleges) on 14.05.2015.


6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The internal organizational structure is as specified for affiliated Colleges under Statute 93 of the University of Calcutta. This structure is democratic and ensures participative management at various levels. The highest decision making authority is the Governing Body of the College comprising of an elected President, Secretary (Principal), two representatives from University of Calcutta, two representatives from the Government of West Bengal, the local Councillor, four teacher representatives, two representatives from non-teaching staff and one student representative. The Principal as the academic and administrative head takes decisions (other than policy related matters) in consultation with the Teachers' Council, Academic Sub- Committee, elected students' representative on academic issues and student affairs. All financial matters are discussed in the Finance Sub-Committee meetings. The purchase related matters are dealt with by the Purchase Sub-Committee after being recommended by the Finance Sub-Committee.

The Principal is assisted in the day-to –day administration also by the Head Assistant who allocates work to Group C and Group D employees and supervises the same. The College Library is run by the Librarian with the help of Library Clerk and Library Peon.

A schematic diagram showing the organizational structure of the institution is given below .

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

The quality improvement strategies of the institution are as follows:

- Teaching & Learning
- i) Appointment of guest faculty to fill up vacant posts temporarily till permanent faculty is appointed on the recommendation of the West Bengal College Service Commission.
- ii) Departmental seminars and invited lectures by experts.
- iii) Remedial classes in addition to classes scheduled in the time table
- iv) Faculty up gradation through participation in Refresher/Orientation programmes, seminars, workshops,etc.
 - Research & Development
- i) Encouragement to faculty to undertake active research for doctoral degree post doctoral achievement or Minor Research Projects.
- ii) Enhancement of qualification of teachers through M.Phil, Ph.D programmes
 - Community engagement
- i) Extension activities undertaken through the two NSS units reaching out to the less privileged children in the neighbourhood slum
- ii) Blood Donation Camp organised every year in association with M.R. Bangur Hospital, with more than 100 student volunteers donating blood.
 - Human resource management
- Optimal utilization of available human resources is sought to be achieved as all staff members actively participate in various institutional activities as members of different sub-committees.
- ii) Students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities such that their talents may be groomed along with their curricular development.

Industry interaction

The scope for such interaction has not been adequately explored till now.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The activities of the College are reviewed through discussions in the Governing Body meetings held regularly. The decisions taken therein are implemented by the Principal and subsequently reported in the next meeting during confirmation of proceedings. Any information or clarification sought by the members of the Governing Body are immediately furnished by the Principal. The minutes of every Governing Body meeting are circulated to the members along with the notice for the next meeting.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

As mentioned in 6.1.8, the College encourages participative management. All teaching and non-teaching staff are involved in various institutional activities in addition to their assigned duties, as members of various sub-committees. Proper motivation and encouragement from the leadership serves to create an atmosphere where all staff members are free to share their opinion about improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

During 2014 - 15, twelve meetings of the Governing Body have been held. The important resolutions adopted (other than routine matters) in these meetings are given below:

- As directed by the G.B. on approaching the DPI (C S) section, the TIC has been informed on 20/05/15 that the proposal involving the financial assistance has been scraped due to the absence of Building Committee resolution of the college.
 - Teacher-in-Charge has been further directed by the DPI (CS) to re-apply for the same with estimate from PWD for building repair.
 - Resolved that PWD authorities be conducted immediately for repair for New Building DPR from them to be realized and after full filling the formalities the fresh proposal to the DPI (CS) to be submitted.
- Resolved that Teacher-in-Charge write a letter to the Executive Engineer/
 Assistant Engineer (Equivalent) (Boro-10) of Calcutta Municipal Corporation,
 Prince Anwar Shah Road, Kolkata, or Executive Engineer/ Assistant Engineer
 of PWD Govt. Of West Bengal to act as a Member of Planning, Development
 and Building Committee of the college.

All decisions of the Governing Body are implemented speedily.

- 6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?
 - The provision for granting autonomy to an affiliated institution exists within the rules of the affiliating University. However, the College is not considering this possibility at present.
- 6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances /complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?
 - Grievances/complaints if any are promptly attended to and resolved through direct involvement of the Head of the institution. Senior teachers and the Head Assistant are always available to deal with any such situation and to assist the Principal in resolving effectively any grievance/complaint. The elected General Secretary of the students also takes care to bring to the notice of the management any genuine problem faced by the students such that the same

can be solved before it turns into a serious grievance.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

No court case has been filed by or against the institution till date.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The student feedback on various aspects of the institution is analyzed by the IQAC at the end of each academic session. The College has been making efforts to provide the facilities which have been asked for by the majority of students.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

All efforts are made to enhance the professional development of staff members. The faculty is encouraged to participate in UGC sponsored Refresher/ Orientation programmes which enable them to be acquainted with the most recent developments in their respective disciplines. Provision is made in the institutional budget for the departments to organize seminars/workshops/invited lectures in every session. Computer training programmes have been organized for the teaching and non-teaching staff. The Librarian has participated in programmes on Library management and automation with the use of latest technology. In all such cases, the institution has followed a liberal policy of granting permission and leave required by the participate in professional development programmes. staff to

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

Faculty empowerment is sought to be achieved by ensuring faculty participation in Orientation and Refresher Courses offered by Academic Staff Colleges of different Universities as well as in seminars, workshops, conferences, summer schools and other short term training programmes.

The policy of participative management involving all employees in the various

activities of the institution through their membership of different sub-committees, serves as a motivating force. The College functions through various sub-committees — comprising of teaching and non-teaching staff members and also student representatives. Collective responsibility assigned to all members of a sub-committee to execute the task allotted to it under the leadership of a Convener is the basic strategy adopted by the institution to ensure effective functioning.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The performance appraisal of the teaching staff is based on self-appraisal and student feedback. Self-appraisal is done through a structured format prescribed by the state government in conformity to the UGC stipulated PBAS containing questions on curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular as well as on research activities. Student feedback is obtained on a ten-point scale through a structured questionnaire covering various aspects of teaching.

The self-appraisal filled up by individual teachers is reviewed in detail especially at the time of their applying for promotion to the next higher scale of pay when the annual self appraisal forms have to be placed before the Screening Committee duly authenticated by the IQAC Coordinator and the Principal.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The Principal reviews the performance appraisal reports of the faculty and communicates deficiencies if any to individual teachers suggesting improvement measures. Good performance by the faculty is also acknowledged by the management. Non-teaching staff are also subject to performance appraisal though informally. Their sincerity and dedication in institutional work assigned to them is appreciated by the management. Lapses, if any, are pointed out immediately to the concerned staff and explanation is sought to prevent recurrence of any negligence in duty.

- 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?
- i) An Employees' Cooperative Credit Society known as Netaji Nagar College Employees' Co-operative Credit Society Ltd., established on 27.01.1977, serves the teaching and non-teaching staff who are members by providing financial loan, financial assistance in case of major illness, etc. The College has not only granted permission for this Body to function but has also allotted a room within the premises.
- ii) The College subscribes to the ESI scheme for the non-teaching staff on College pay.
- iii) A Staff Benefit Fund for the non-teaching staff on College pay is maintained where an employee deposits a minimum of 10% of salary with a matching contribution by the College. Employees can avail of financial loan from this Fund in case of need.
- 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Appointment of permanent faculty having requisite UGC qualification and recommended by the West Bengal College Service Commission serves to ensure that the best candidates are appointed. Temporary faculty is also recruited through proper advertisements in newspapers and after being selected by a duly constituted selection — committee. This enables the institution to attract well qualified faculty. The institution makes all efforts to retain competent faculty by providing infrastructural support needed for teaching and research activities. The library is well endowed with books and journals on all subjects offered by the institution. The faculty is provided individual access to e-resources through the N-List programme of INFLIBNET to which the College subscribes regularly. The management is very supportive and encouraging so far as granting permission and leave to faculty is concerned for participation in various faculty development programmes.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

All steps are taken to ensure that the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources is foolproof and transparent. The following process is maintained in the managing of financial

resources for purchases above Rs. 30,000/- (thirty thousand) of non-recurring items:

- Purchase Requisitions are submitted by Departments/Committees/Library/individuals duly signed by respective Departmental Head/Convener/Librarian and the Principal to the Accounts department.
- 2. Approval by Finance Sub-Committee.
- 3. Approval by Purchase Sub-Committee.
- 4. Approval by the Principal / Governing Body.

After approval of the requisitions, Notice Inviting Tender is displayed on the Notice Board for local suppliers/vendors as well as displayed on the college website. For purchases involving large amounts, tender notice is also published in a widely circulated newspaper. Quotations are opened and verified by the Purchase Committee and comparison table prepared on the basis of the prices quoted. Finally orders are placed with the company which has quoted the least price.

In case of equipments or furniture, purchases from branded company or Manufacturer like Godrej, Raj & Raj, HP, HCL, etc., the Purchase Committee advises to give order directly based on single quotation only.

All bank accounts have dual signatories — the Principal and the President/Approved Member of the Governing Body, and no cheque can be issued without the knowledge of the authorized signatories. At the end of the year a full audit of all accounts is undertaken by a Government-recommended Auditor. If there are any objections or recommendations from the Auditor, steps are taken for compliance at the earliest.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Internal Audit: The College has its own internal audit mechanism operated by the Internal Auditor who is assisted by the Accounts section of the College Office. The internal mechanism for passing bills and making payments is strict and foolproof. All the financial decisions are taken by the Finance Sub- Committee and finally approved by the Governing Body to ensure strict financial discipline.

External Audit: The external audit is conducted every year by the Government appointed statutory auditor nominated by the Government of West Bengal. The Accountant with the help of internal auditor prepares the accounts and places them first before the Bursar for approval, and then places them before the Finance Committee. The recommendations of the Finance Committee are then

placed before the Governing Body by the Principal/Secretary of the Governing Body. It is then placed for audit. Annual audit has been completed till the financial year 2013-14.

There is no major audit objection.

- 6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.
 - a) The major sources of institutional receipts / funding are –
 - i. Grant received from the UGC
 - ii. Grant received from the State Government.
 - iii. Fees paid by the students.
 - b) The audited Income-Expenditure statements for the financial years 2011-12, 2012-13 and 2013-14 are given as Annexure. Till date there is no deficit.
- 6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The institution receives its major funds from the UGC and the State Government, apart from fees paid by students. However, all efforts are made to secure additional funding from different sources. For example, proposals are submitted for the MPLAD or MLALAD grants for specific needs. There is no guarantee that these will be obtained, but lump-sum amounts have been received in the past for various developmental activities like construction of Computer Centre building. Whenever these funds are received, they are properly utilized and the Utilization Certificates are submitted within the due date.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)?. If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

An Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was formally established in the College in March 2011. The College is committed to quality assurance in teaching-learning, in sports and games, in financial management, and in overall governance. Well qualified faculty is appointed as per UGC norms on the recommendation of the West Bengal College Service Commission. Vacancy in teaching post if any is filled up immediately through the appointment of

temporary faculty possessing requisite qualification on College pay, till the recruitment of permanent faculty is completed. Remedial classes are held for slow learners. Students excel in sports and games as evident from the prizes won in inter-college tournaments every year. Financial discipline is maintained. Though student fees are kept at a minimum level in comparison to other undergraduate colleges, there is no deficit till date and the audited income-expenditure statement shows a surplus. The Governing Body as the highest policy decision making authority is always responsive to the specific institutional needs. Meeting of the Governing Body is held at regular intervals and all decisions are taken democratically ensuring good governance.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The IQAC after thorough scrutiny recommends to the Governing Body the names of faculty who fulfil the Government stipulated criteria for promotion to the next higher scale of pay through the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS). The Governing Body then approves the IQAC decision and accordingly the affiliating University and the Higher Education department, Govt. of West Bengal are approached for recommending the name/names of subject expert and govt. nominee for the Screening/Selection Committee for CAS of concerned faculty.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details of its operalisation

The institution has its own framework for ensuring quality of the academic and administrative activities. This framework comprises of the Governing Body at the apex, the IQAC, the Academic Sub-Committee, Teachers' Council and various sub-committees. Academic and administrative activities are undertaken by different sub-committees and subsequently reviewed by the IQAC/Teachers' Council/Academic Sub-Committee and finally by the Governing Body.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The College so far has not felt the need to provide special training to the staff for the implementation of the Quality assurance procedures. Effective functioning of the institution within the guidelines prescribed by the University of Calcutta and by the Education Directorate of the state govt., bears testimony to the fact that the College staff at all levels has the ability and experience to implement the Quality assurance procedures.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Academic audit by the University of Calcutta had been undertaken in 2007 after NAAC accreditation (1st cycle). The same will be held in 2016.

External review of the academic provisions has earned the institution the 10^{th} rank among the best Commerce colleges of the city in 2008 and again in 2011 as published in India Today.

Appropriate improvement measures will be initiated after Academic Audit is conducted by the University of Calcutta in 2016 and the report is received by the College.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The College strives to maintain internal quality assurance mechanisms within the guidelines set by the NAAC. Sustained efforts are made towards (i) effective delivery of the University stipulated curriculum, (ii) learner centric teaching and learning (iii) Encouragement to the faculty for active research and widening extension activities (iv) infrastructural upgradation (v) strengthening the student support system (vi)good governance through democratic and participatory management (vii) innovative and best practices, as far as possible within the available resources and subject to the constraints faced.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The teaching learning process is continuously reviewed through the following bodies:

- i) All important decisions regarding teaching learning are taken through the Academic Sub-Committee comprising of heads of all departments. Performance of students in internal examinations is reviewed in its meetings. Recommendations of Academic Sub-Committee are placed before the Governing Body for approval.
- ii) The teaching learning process is also discussed in the meetings of the Teachers' Council since it is a statutory body comprising of all faculty holding substantive posts.

- iii) The students' feedback on individual teacher is also an important mechanism for review of the teaching learning process.
- iv) Discussion with parents during parent-teacher meetings is also an effective means of reviewing the teaching learning process.
- 6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The internal and external stakeholders are aware of the quality assurance policies and mechanisms as the outcomes are manifested in all institutional activities throughout the year-academic, co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension programmes. The College prospectus and the institutional website contains detailed information relating to the functioning of the institution and the quality assurance policies and mechanisms are in-built into it.

Any other relevant information regarding Governance, Leadership and Management which the College would like to include.

Netaji Nagar Day College born out of the trifurcation of Netaji Nagar College in 1986 is governed according to Statute 93 of the University of Calcutta First Statutes 1979, by a Governing Body which has a democratic structure with representatives from the major groups of stakeholders and from the University of Calcutta and the State government . The College functions through a number of sub-committees constituted by the Governing Body and/or by the Teachers' Council, under the overall leadership of the Principal. Democratic and decentralised governance is practised and strict financial discipline is observed. A culture of participative management is encouraged.

CRITERIA VII - INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1. Environmental Consciousness

7.1.1. Does the institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The College has not yet conducted a comprehensive green audit. However energy audit has been done internally as a first step towards green audit. Electricity charges constitute a major component of the recurring expenses of the institution. The energy audit undertaken has revealed that energy consumption can be curtailed significantly through conservation measures.

7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Some of the initiatives taken to make the campus eco-friendly are stated below:

Energy Conservation:

- a) The employees and students are advised to use natural light as far as possible and to turn off the switches of lights, fans etc. whenever not in use.
- b) Copper chokes in tube lights are converted to electronic chokes, which consume less energy.
- c) Installation of air conditioner is avoided
- d) Incandescent lights are gradually being replaced by energy saving CFL lights.
- e) LCD monitors are being purchased to reduce the electricity consumption.
- f) Electrical wiring has been changed with new wiring to eliminate chances of power leakage.
- g) Wooden panel of windows are being gradually replaced by glass panels to utilise the natural light.

Use of renewable energy:

The college is exploring the possibility of installing Solar Grid Panel on the rooftop to harness solar energy. For this purpose West Bengal Renewable Energy Development Agency (WBREDA) has been approached. Awareness programmes on use of renewable energy are scheduled to be organized in the College in association with WBREDA.

Water Harvesting:

The college has future plans for rain water harvesting.

Check dam construction:

There is no scope for check dam construction.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality:

- i. Trees have been planted on the land owned by the College in the neighbourhood for the proposed second campus.
- ii. A large number of students and significant number of staff come to the College on foot or on bicycles, thereby avoiding CO₂ emission from vehicles.
- iii. Awareness regarding CO₂ emission and carbon neutrality is sought to be enhanced through seminar/ workshop organised in the College.

Plantation:

Please refer to (i) above

Hazardous Waste Management:

The college does not generate any hazardous waste. The wastes generated in the laboratories are disposed off in the proper way to avoid environmental pollution.

e-waste management:

Computers, printers and other ICT equipments which become unrepairable are disposed off through vendors for recycling, with the objective of reducing volume of e-waste.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1. Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Some of the innovations introduced during recent years which have contributed positively in effective functioning of the College are stated below:

- a) For greater effectiveness of the Library as a learning resource, initiatives for Library automation have been undertaken. Library management software WINISIS was initially installed which has been subsequently replaced by the more user-friendly KOHA. To ensure access to e-resources, the College has subscribed to the N-List programme of INFLIBNET. All members of the faculty have been provided individual password under this programme and can access e-resources both in-campus and off-campus.
- b) The major infrastructural upgradation achieved in recent years are the installation of CCTV in the Library for enhanced security, establishment of IT lab for the Department of Commerce, new electrical wiring for one building, procurement of new computers for departments, library and office, establishment of a common IT lab for use by all departments, purchase of new equipments for Science laboratories, installation of COSA for accounts.
- c) Encouragement to faculty to undertake active research has culminated in receipt of Ph.D degree by four (04) members of the faculty, submission of Final Report of UGC funded Minor Research Project by four (04) members of the faculty, sanction by UGC of Minor Research Project to two (02)

faculty members, award of Post-Doctoral fellowship in University of Oxford to a faculty member by the Department of Bio-Technology, Govt. of India. The liberal policy of the institution to grant leave to faculty for participating in various faculty upgradation programmes has ensured the participation of faculty in Orientation programmes, Refresher courses, Summer schools, Seminars/ Conferences/ Workshops etc. in national and foreign Universities. The Librarian has also participated in HRD programme and staff training programme conducted by university and other institutions.

- d) The student feedback system has been strengthened by obtaining student feedback through uniform questionnaire provided to students of all departments and also by providing a separate questionnaire on institutional provisions in addition to that on individual teacher.
- e) The student support mechanism has been strengthened by providing
 - i) Tuition fee and lab charge concessions to increasing number of students belonging to economically disadvantaged section of the society, in every academic session;
 - ii) Remedial coaching to slow learners belonging to SC/ST/OBC/Minority, free of cost and the same to slow learners belonging to General category on payment of a nominal fee under relevant UGC scheme;
 - iii) Govt. service Entry-level Coaching (by utilizing UGC grant) for final year and passed out students belonging to SC/ST/OBC/Minority, free of cost and the same to students belonging to General category on payment of a nominal fee;
 - iv) Tuition fee and lab charge concessions as well as sportswear and sports shoes to students who excel in sports and games.
- f) As part of Institutional Social Responsibility, various extension activities and outreach programmes have been undertaken through the NSS units of the College with the active involvement of the Students' Union. Through these programmes students become aware of their role in society as responsible citizens. In this respect, special mention may be made of (i) the annual Blood Donation camp organized every year since 2012, with the help of M.R. Bangur Hospital wherein more than one hundred donors (mainly students), donate blood; and (ii) the week long special NSS camp held in the neighbouring Khanpur slum every year, especially for the less privileged children living therein.
- g) Initiatives have been undertaken to create environmental consciousness among the staff and students through the Science & Nature Club. One very successful endeavour of the Club is the Science Exhibition- "Save the Earth-Save our Planet- Protect the Environment" held in 2015, with the spontaneous participation of students especially from the Science departments. As a first

step towards Green audit, energy audit has been initiated as an internal endeavour and it will help to identify wasteful consumption of energy and to implement energy conservation measures.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices in the given format at page no.98, which have contributed to the achievement of the institutional objectives and/or contributed to the quality improvement of the core activities of the College.

Two best practices which have contributed to the achievement of the institutional objectives and/or contributed to the quality improvement of the core activities of the College are as follows:

- 1) Widening the access to higher education for economically weaker section of the society.
- 2) Noteworthy participation of students in sports and games and in extension activity.

The two best practices are presented in the prescribed format below.

Best Practice No. 1

- **Title of the Practice:**
 - Widening the access to higher education for disadvantaged section of the society
- **❖** Goal

To ensure access to higher education for the students belonging to SC/ST/OBC/Minority community, other economically weaker section and for women

The Context:

In order to fulfill the vision and mission of the founders who desired to establish a seat of higher learning within the reach of the hapless people displaced from their roots in erstwhile East Pakistan, the College has been following a policy of offering maximum access so that students belonging to disadvantaged section of the society can also get the opportunity of higher education.

The Practice:

 The College strictly adheres to the reservation policy of the Government for admission of students to different courses of study offered.

- ii. Remedial coaching for slow learners from SC/ST/OBC/Minority community is provided free of cost, by utilizing UGC grant.
- iii. Govt. service Entry Level Coaching is also provided free of cost to final year and passed out students belonging to SC/ST/OBC/Minority community under the UGC funded scheme.
- iv. Tuition fee and lab charge concession is provided to a significant number of students from economically weaker section of the society in every academic session. The fee collected from all students under Students' Relief Fund is also promptly disbursed to those students who face severe financial crisis.

***** Evidence of success:

The large number of students belonging to disadvantaged groups taking admission in various courses offered by this institution bears evidence of the success of the policy and practice of this institution to widen the access to higher education. The following table shows the number of students from reserved category and the number of women across all courses offered by this College:

Problems Encountered and Resources required:

The number of students belonging to economically disadvantaged section of the society taking admission in this College is quite large. Moreover, the policy of the institution to keep all fees at minimum level and also provide tuition fee concession to needy students involves a huge financial burden. This burden is felt all the more because, the institution is compelled to function with a large number of teachers (guest faculty) and non-teaching staff on College pay, due to lack of sufficient number of sanctioned teaching / non-teaching posts and also due to sanctioned posts lying vacant for years.

For sustainability, this practice requires that the College should at least receive a continuous flow of financial assistance from the U.G.C. for the Remedial Coaching Scheme for slow learners as well as for the Govt. Service Entry level Coaching Scheme. Financial assistance for infrastructural development from the U.G.C. and the State Government also becomes a necessity as college fees are kept at a minimum level.

Best Practice No. 2

Title of the Practice

Noteworthy participation of students in sports and games and extension activity.

❖ Goal:

To fulfill the mission of the College to provide a system of education in which students can participate wholeheartedly in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities to enrich their health and mind and also undertake welfare activities having 'community orientation'.

❖ The Context:

Students, many of whom are from disadvantaged section of the society, have various inherent potential and capability in the field of performing arts, sports and games etc. Under active institutional encouragement, such potential can be groomed to maturity and may well become professional pursuits in course of time. Besides, the importance of sports and games for a healthy body and healthy mind cannot be denied especially for the youth.

The College is aware of the Institutional Social Responsibility and seeks to ensure students' awareness and commitment to the needs of the less privileged in the neighbourhood.

The Practice

Students' participation in sports and games is actively encouraged by the institution. Outstanding sportsmen are given preference for admission to the courses offered by the College. Tuition fee and lab charge concession is made available to the students who excel in sports and games. Sportswear and sports shoes are provided to the players of the college team. The College football team, cricket team, rowing team participate in Inter-College tournaments and have shown outstanding performances. Several students successfully participate in athletics in the West Bengal Inter-College State Athletic Meet every year. Extension activities are undertaken through the NSS units of the College. Such activities are varied in nature ranging from spreading awareness against 'Drug Abuse', 'Illicit Trafficking', 'Voters' Awareness campaign, to planting trees, special camp adopted slum in neighbouring Khanpur area, Blood Donation camp etc.

\(\structure \) Evidence of success:

Emerging as champions in Inter-College football tournaments has been a tradition for the College. The cricket team has also emerged as semi-finalist or quarter-finalist in most years. The Rowing team is recently doing very well and emerged as 2nd Runners up in the BRC Inter-College Rowing Championship, 2015. Athletes from the College have also won medals at the State and District level competitions.

The wide range of extension activities successfully undertaken over the years by the College through the NSS units is ample evidence of success of such institutional endeavour. The NSS volunteers from the College have been awarded Best Male Volunteer and Best Female Volunteer in 2010-11 and 2011-12 and as Best Female Volunteer in 2012-13. The Programme Officers of NSS units of the College have also won awards as Best Programme Officer in 2009-10 and again in 2012-13.

Problems Encountered and Resources required:

Funds for NSS activity are not always received on time from the University. As student fees are kept at a minimum level, the institution does not have ample resources to undertake extension activity on large scale from internal resources. The (1+1+1) system of University examinations leaves very little time for sports and games as well as for extension activity within an academic session.

Post Accreditation Initiatives

After being accredited by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council in 2007, the work of planning and executing quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures has been rather slow initially. As a first step towards quality assurance, an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was formally established in March, 2011. Though the post accreditation initiatives took some time to gain momentum, the College has made significant progress in all respects after the first cycle accreditation.

The institutional encouragement to faculty for continuous upgradation has been fruitful. In the post-accreditation period, 10 (ten) faculty members have received doctoral degree, 03 (three) faculty members have received M.Phil degree, one faculty member has completed post-doctoral research project funded by the Department of Bio-Technology, Govt. of India at Oxford University, one faculty member has submitted PhD thesis at Jadavpur University in August 2015, 04 (four) faculty members have registered for doctoral research, and 07 (seven) UGC funded Minor Research Projects have been undertaken. The publications by the faculty are also noteworthy. The faculty has also extended consultancy services in its areas of expertise to other institutions – teaching at the postgraduate level, paper setting, moderation and evaluation for examinations of other Universities, resource person for seminars and workshops organized by other institutions, research guidance, advisory service for school education, etc.

The Department of Commerce has ranked among the ten best Commerce colleges in the city of Kolkata according to India Today report for the years 2008, 2011 and 2012. The Postgraduate course in Commerce introduced by the College has made remarkable progress in the post-accreditation period. The first batch of postgraduate students passed out in 2008. The College has recorded a very high pass percentage (100% in most years) and a significant number of students securing first class marks in this course from 2008 onwards. For enhancing employability of students, the Department of Commerce has organized (i) short term certificate course for the postgraduate students in association with the Centre of Excellence in Financial Markets, a joint venture of Calcutta University and Calcutta Stock Exchange, (ii) soft skill development programme in association with a professional institute Edulight Learning. The Department has also organized many seminars and workshops in association with other institutions. The notable among such initiatives in the post-accreditation period are the seminar on "Accounting Standard" in association with Indian Accounting Association in 2008, on "Pushing Financial Inclusion: Issues, Challenges and Way Forward" in association with Sushil Kar College in 2011, on "Financial Planning for Young Investors" in association with SEBI in 2013.

Post Accreditation Initiatives

The College has been serving as a Zonal centre for evaluation and scrutiny of answer scripts of University examinations in various subjects like Bengali, History, Economics, Mathematics, etc. notwithstanding the space constraint. The college also renders its services to Government agencies by acting as a centre for various competitive examinations of the West Bengal Staff Selection Commission, Railway Recruitment Board etc.

The college has endeavoured to make the teaching-learning process student-centric. The faculty is always responsive to the learning needs and abilities of the students. The post accreditation period has witnessed the introduction of the Remedial coaching scheme (UGC funded) for slow learners beyond College hours. Such coaching is provided free of cost for SC/ST/OBC/Minority community students, and on nominal fee for the General category students. The performance of the students in University examinations has been good as the pass percentage of the College has surpassed that of the University in all years. A significant number of students have secured first class marks in various disciplines. The College is proud of some outstanding students like Shreyasi Nandi of the Dept. of Geography who is the University topper in B.Sc (Geography Hons) in 2014, Debosmita Das of the Dept. of Computer Science for being awarded Merit Card by the University of Calcutta for 9th place in B.Sc (Computer Science Hons.) in 2012, Indranil Majumder of B.Sc (General) whose article has been published in Spigot Science from the U.S.A, in 2015. The postgraduate course in Commerce has also recorded a very high pass percentage every year since 2007-08.

The College has been able to organize four National Seminars/Conferences funded by the UGC and a large number of College level seminars/workshops in the postaccreditation period.

Student support services have been extended. A large number of economically less privileged students are allowed tuition fee and lab charge concessions by the College. The applications of students for scholarships from Government agencies like SC/ST Post-Matric scholarship, scholarships from the West Bengal Minority Development & Finance Corporation, One-time financial assistance to girl students under Kanyashree Prakalpa of Govt. of West Bengal, etc. have been promptly forwarded by the College. Career guidance services are provided to students graduating from this institution. A significant support service provided to students in the post accreditation period is the Govt. Service Entry level coaching available at free of cost for SC/ST/OBC/Minority students and on nominal charge for the General category students. The most recent initiative undertaken by the College for the benefit of the disadvantaged section of students is the establishment of an Equal Opportunity Centre under the UGC guidelines. This Centre has organised awareness programme regarding the rights and privileges of

reserved category, minority community and girl students. The Centre has planned to introduce training in self-defence for women.

Encouragement to students for sports and games has resulted in their spontaneous participation in various events at the intra-College and inter-College levels. The College Football, Cricket and Rowing teams have emerged as winners/runners almost every year in various inter-college tournaments. Several prizes are won in athletics also every year. The outstanding sportsmen are provided tuition fee concession and also sportswear and sports shoes by the College. The students have also excelled in various co-curricular activities such as debate (Mock Parliament), drama, literary contributions to the College magazine, departmental Wall magazine, etc.

Library resources are augmented annually by utilising UGC grant when available, otherwise through internal funding. In the post-accreditation period, partial automation of library services has been achieved. The display section in the library has been enlarged. Internet facility has been made available to the faculty and students in the UGC Network Resource Centre in the library. The college library is registered under the N-LIST programme of INFLIBNET which gives the faculty and students access to online books and journals. A water purifier has been installed in front of the library so that the students who spent long hours in the library can quench their thirst. The library is under surveillance through CCTV and multiple cameras.

Infrastructural upgradation achieved in recent years also includes the setting up of IT lab for the Department of Commerce, a common IT lab for all departments, launching of institutional website, introduction of online admission system, computerization of accounts, in addition to procurement of new equipments for Science laboratories, Library, departments and the College office as and when required. The College has approached the West Bengal Renewable Energy Development Agency (WBREDA) for the installation of solar panels at subsidized rates. Energy audit has been undertaken internally to identify the sources of wastage of electricity within the campus and to adopt conservation measures.

Extension activities have been undertaken through the two NSS units and blood donation camps organized by the college every year since 2012. The NSS Programme Officers, Dr. Pranjal Chakraborty and Sri Tapan Purkait have been recognized as 'Best Programme Officer' by the NSS Wing of the University of Calcutta in 2009-10 and 2012-13 respectively. Five students have bagged the 'Best Volunteer' award in their respective sessions. Aveek Bhattacherjee, a student of Commerce stream, represented the University of Calcutta at the Republic Day Parade Camp, 2012 in New Delhi. He has been awarded as the best NSS volunteer for 2012-13 by the Govt. of West Bengal.

Post Accreditation Initiatives

Netaji Nagar Day College is moving ahead along the path of Quality enhancement and Quality sustenance delineated by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council. Several challenges are being faced. The biggest challenge is the space constraint which stands in the way of further growth and expansion. It may take some time to overcome this challenge. But the cohesive spirit of all stakeholders, the commitment of the staff and students and the efficient and judicious leadership and management will undoubtedly steer the institution towards overall progress and excellence in the coming years.



Section I: Introduction

A heroic struggle of the local people caused the establishment of Netaji Nagar Vidyamandir, a secondary school, which was constructed overnight on 2nd January 1951. It marked the beginning of the struggle for establishing educational institutions in the area. In response to the local demands the idea for the establishment of the Netaji Nagar College was mooted and the college came into existence on 25th September, 1967. A phenomenal rise in student strength within a very short period of years from a rapidly expanding zone necessitated the academic and administrative trifurcation of the institution into three separate colleges. In April, 1986, Netaji Nagar Day college began its career as co-educational, grant in aid institution with affiliation from Calcutta University and University Grants Commission. The college has set its goals to provide value-based, disciplined, socially committed, and scientifically sound education to students so as to prepare them for becoming responsible citizens of India.

The college now extends teaching facilities in Honours subjects in the three streams of Arts, Science and Commerce. Post-Graduate course in Commerce has been introduced on 22nd September 2006 on self-financing basis. The college got its affiliation from the Calcutta University in the year 1967 and U.G.C recognition Under 2(f) and 12(B) in the year 1997. The college is presently running as Grant-in-aid College in the urban locality in a campus spread over 4411.9 Sq.Mts. including play ground area of 2466.75 Sq. Mts

The College currently has 17 departments and offer, four programmes at UG level, one PG course in the faculty of Commerce. The College has at present 74 faculty members of which 34 are permanent, including one Graduate Lab Instructor, 09 Full time contract and 31 part-time teachers. Out of the 74 teachers 23 are Ph.D. and 07 M.Phil holders, 11 teachers have completed UGC, NET and SLET examinations. The college has 28 Administrative Staff and 20 Technical and Supporting Staff. The total enrolment of the students in 2005 – 06 is 2484 including 987 women students. Out of total student strength - 241 SC, 07 ST, 04 OBC



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students, Some of the students are first generation learners. The College has limited space for the present activities with little scope for future expansion. The current infrastructural facilities include Central Library, Computer Centre, Laboratories, Class Rooms, Students' Common Rooms, UGC-NET Centre, Play Ground, a cheap store and a Canteen.

The unit cost of education in the year 2005-06 is Rs. 6,749/- while the unit cost excluding salary component is Rs. 562/-. The college follows modular system of teaching and evaluation.

The Netaji Nagar Day College, Kolkata, West Bengal volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore and submitted the Self Study Report in the year 2007. A self-study report along with all supportive documents was submitted NAAC constituted a Peer Team with Prof. J.L.Gupta (Chairman), Vice-Chancellor, Guru Ghasidas University, Bilaspur, Dr.Mamata Satapathy, Former UGC Emeritus Fellow and Prof. and Head... Department of Physics, Vani Vihar Uttakal University, Bhubaneshwar and Dr. Prakash G. Puranik, Ex-Director, PG Department and Research Academy, Sevadal Mahila Mahavidyalaya, Nagpur, Maharashtra, as Member and Dr. M.S. Shyamsundar, Deputy Advisor, NAAC, functioned as co-coordinating officer for the assessment and accreditation process.

The Peer Team visited the college on 19-20 March 2007. It had detailed discussion on matters related to academic programmes, curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The team visited the departments and interacted with the Principal, the teachers, non-teachers and students. The team visited and assessed common facilities, classrooms, laboratories and sports facilities. The team also met members of the Management, Parent Teacher and Alumni associations.

During the onsite visit, the Peer Team organized meetings and held discussions with various constituents of the institution as per the scheduled programme. The team has verified various documents related to the college and its activities. After visiting the institution and examining the system, policies, procedures and infrastructural facilities the team makes the following criterion-wise analysis and records overall observations and suggestions.



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Section 2 : Criterion-wise Analysis

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The vision of the college is to be a leading college in Kolkata, providing a well resourced strongly academic, holistic education to boys and girls. The mission of the college is to provide a safe and caring environment to students so as to promote interaction between the three sections of the academic community- Students-Teachers and Non-teaching employees. It is also proposed by the college to provide a value- based system of education to the students. This will encourage them to participate in all such co-curricular activities, which will improve their health and mind. The students will be motivated to participate in welfare activities having "Community Orientation". The mission and goals of the institution are reflected to some extent in the curriculum offered. The aim of the college is to achieve academic excellence in education. The programmes offered reflect a fair blend of tradition and modernity.

The College imparts Under Graduate education in Faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce. The medium of instruction is both English and Bengali. In the faculty of Science it offers Hons. courses in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Computer Science, Economics and Geography and general pass courses in Zoology, Physiology, and Electronics Science. In the Faculty of Arts, it offers Hons. courses in Bengali, English, History, Political Science, and General Pass courses in Philosophy and Education. It is to be noted that Geography and Economics Hons, students get B.Sc degree where Pass students with these two subjects as an elective get B.A degree. In the faculty of Commerce it offers two Hons. courses in Accounting and Finance and Marketing. The various subject combinations available to the students for their selection are decided by the University. English and Bengali (Alternative English) are compulsory for all the degree students. In addition, Environmental Science course is offered as compulsory papers for all degree students in the first year as non core option. The College has started a self-financing M.Com course in Accounting and Finance from the current year 2006-07. The peer Team observed that most of the courses offered are traditional and some of them are not favoured by the students. The College may review these subjects, revamp them based on the student feedback and peer opinion. In addition the college through its Computer Centre offers a number of self-financing courses like DCA,



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DTP, Multimedia& Internet, Financial Accounting, Oracle and Visual Basic. The Peer Team is aware of the constraints of the affiliated colleges, yet it recommends that in order to make the students globally competitive in job market, the college make effort to introduce more number of other professional courses relevant to the current trends and present day need. During the last five years the College has introduced Hons, courses in Computer Science, Geography and Commerce.

Being an affiliated College the college is not provided with the flexibility to modify or frame its syllabus. As such the College follows the Syllabi prescribed by the Board Of Studies (BOS) of Calcutta University and only one teacher of the college is a member BOS. There are 03 ICT enabled courses. The major change in the syllabus has taken place in the years 2004-2005 and 2005-2006 in all the subjects. The institution has undertaken the measure for the preparation of academic calendars containing the modular courses. The college conducts regular class tests, tutorial classes, etc. for enhancing and sustaining academic quality of students.

Teachers of different subjects extend mutual co-operation in taking classes, evaluation of answer script, organizing workshop/special extension lectures on contemporary and interdisciplinary issues.

The college has introduced the scheme for obtaining student's feedback on the teacher's performance, academic programs, campus environment, curricula development etc. However, analysis and action on the process are yet to be taken. Moreover the college has not yet developed formal mechanism for the collection of feedback from peers, employer and other stakeholder of the college.

Criterion II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

There is an absolute transparency in the admission process and the merit lists are prepared by the respective departments on the basis of agreed criteria. Students are selected on the basis of merit. All the admissions are done in accordance with the rules and regulations of the University and State Government of West Bengal. Special care is taken to treat male and female students at par and to eliminate any sort of possibility of 'gender discrimination' in coeducation.



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The students knowledge, needs and skills are assessed on the basis of their result of previous examination at the Higher Secondary level. The college distinguishes between slow and advanced learners on the basis of their perception ability as assessed by the teachers while taking the classes and their performance in examinations. However there is no provision for bridge/ remedial courses for the slow learners. The departments, as a part of innovative teaching plan, frames modular academic calendars at the outset of each session. The modular division of syllabi of programmes enables the teachers to maintain smooth teaching schedule through the academic sessions.

The working and teaching days of the college are 262 and 216 respectively in the academic year 2004-05. All the faculty members of the college are qualified. Out of them 23 teachers are with Ph.D. and 07 teachers are with M.Phil as the highest qualification, 11 teachers have completed UGC, NET and SLET examinations. The teacher student ratio is 1:33. The percentage of the faculty served as resource person in Workshop/Seminars/Conferences during the last five years is 16. Twenty-three teachers have participated in refresher course in the last five years and four teachers have attended orientation programme. During the last five years, the college has organized 10 seminars/workshops/symposia on curricular development, teaching learning, assessment, etc. The Departments of Mathematics and Computer Science organized a state-level conference on Geriatrics and Gerentological studies in West Bengal in 2004 with the financial assistance from UGC. They have also organized a workshop on Mobile Computing in 2002.

The teachers mainly adopt the traditional chalk and talk method in most of the traditional courses. However, occasional use of modern gadgets like computer, OHP, LCD Projector, slide projector, CD, VCR etc. In teaching is seen in the Commerce and few science departments. The college has not yet introduced the system of participatory learning process in its teaching method. Along with the conventional classroom lectures, students' participation in seminars, tutorials and tests has to be encouraged. The college may think of establishing a Language laboratory in the English department to improve the communication skill of the students. The students are also to be encouraged to use the internet and other media for their project work and seminar presentations. The use of microphone in big class rooms along with that of Overhead projector, LCD Projector at a limited scale have been introduced for students of Commerce in addition to the use of Computers in laboratory-based subjects. The college arranges the expertise available with the research organizations and university through extension lectures and seminar talks.



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The college through its computer center sometimes offers the programme of training in Computer application for its employees for the advancement of their career through its Computer Centre. The Internet facilities are available for the students in library, Department of Computer Science and in the IT Laboratory. Six departments in the college are equipped with computers in their respective laboratories.

The College follows the annual pattern of examinations. To assess the academic progress of the students, each department conducts regular class tests, eligibility tests for Hons. students, half yearly and pre-final examinations etc. However, from the academic year 2005-06 the University changed the system from (2+1) to (1+1+1) examination pattern for all UG courses and also introduced internal assessment. So from this academic year each department continuously assesses the students through regular class tests, seminars, laboratory tests, quiz, discussions etc. and sends the marks to the university. The schedules of the tests and examinations are notified to the students well in advance at the commencement of the academic year through the college calendar and display in the Notice Boards. The college informs the parents/guardians about the performance of the students if they ask for it, or in parent-guardian meet. But the system of directly communicating to the parents/guardians has not yet been adopted. The college does not have any scope for evaluation reform. However the answer scripts of the college tests and examinations are shown to the students.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Being an undergraduate college catering mainly to the arts subjects research is not a significant activity of the College. However, most of the teachers are pursuing their research degrees for career development. Teachers are given study leave to complete their research projects and to attend the seminars and conferences. Considerable numbers of teachers have research publications in the form of books and papers/articles in various journals to their credits. During the last 5 years 03 faculty members have acquired the Ph.D. There are 03 ongoing UGC sponsored minor research projects at the total outlay of Rs. 1,84,000. Students are also encouraged to prepare project reports. Teachers have published 53 papers in International journals, 27 in National refereed journals, 14 in college journals and some teachers have written 36 books. One teacher is a recognized supervisor for Ph.D. in Calcutta University and Jadavpur University. One teacher attended world congress on Economics twice. No research collaboration with outside institution and university has been



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started in the college, however some teachers have academic contact with members of other institutions and universities on personal basis. As yet the college has not developed any consultancy service through which it can generate some revenue.

The college has an NSS unit and is actively involved in various social outreach activities and Extension services. Departments in collaboration with NSS unit of the college conduct various activities such as Blood group detection, Measurement of blood pressure, collection of blood for detecting the possibility of occurrence of Thalassaemia, campaign against dangers of Malaria, Dengue, Arsenic pollution of water, etc.

The college promotes participation of the students and the faculty in different extension activities of its NSS wing. The college has undertaken a project to ensure social justice and to empower under-privileged sections such as children, women and elderly people. Extensive surveys were conducted with respect to socio-economic conditions of the child labour, sex workers and elderly people suffering from geriatric problems.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is located in urban locality having a campus area of only 4411.90 Sq. Mts. The built in area of the college is 40980 Sq.Mts. Within this periphery the College has adopted plan for augmenting the infrastructure to keep pace with the academic growth. The college exclusively owns two four storied buildings. The College provides a number of infrastructure facility such as separate class rooms, laboratories Library and Office room for administrative purposes. The Students' Centre comprises of Students' Union Room, Boys' Common-Room, Girls Common-Room and Students' Canteen. The College ensures optimum utilization of its infrastructure facility by making maximum use of space. The college shares its playfield with other two colleges under the same management.

The maintenance of infrastructure is executed by the occasional grants from U.G.C., M.P.LAD scheme and the State Govt. The college has striven to balance fruitfully the two sides of income and expenditure.

The college has a Central Library with 14,140 books and a reading room and subscribes to four National and one International Journal and several periodicals. The library software has been already installed and automation has just started. To encourage reading habits the college sets aside some budget for purchase of General reading materials. Total carpet area



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of the Central Library is 2,415 Sq. Mts. With a small reading room. The library of the college is partially automated. The ratio of the library books to the number of students is 5:1.

There is an Advisory Committee for the library. It consists of ten members, represented by the full time Assistant Librarian acting as a convenor, four teachers' representatives, two non-teaching employees' representative and one representative from students in addition to the Principal who acts as Chairman. The budget is prepared for the library in consultation with the Convenor Finance Committee and Bursar. The facilities of computer and Internet are available in the library. There is a photocopy machine in the coilege. The amount spent on Books and Journals during the academic session is Rs. 1,38,137/-. The library day is observed on 20th December every year in order to motivate the students and teachers to read existing and new books and Journals.

The Computer Centre of the college is housed in its own four-storied site. It provides the students with state of the art facilities with all updated provisions and equipments in its conference room, classrooms and laboratories. The facility of Computer is needed to be extended to all faculties and students. As a part of outreach programmes, the Computer Centre offers a range of certificate courses and it also operates a "KIDS CENTRE" to encourage local children to learn operation of computer at an elementary level. The college computer center has developed a software package for generation of mark sheet and certificate. This package is being used by the West Bengal State Council of Technical Education.

The college does not have adequate facilities for sports and games. It has one multipurpose field in the campus for football and cricket and has facilities for some indoor games. Inspite of the limited facilities the students participate in various types of sports events and bag prizes and medals especially in football.

The college does not have a health centre of its own. However it has joined the Students Health Home from which the college students get basic health facilities with nominal payment. The College has a canteen to cater to the needs of the students, staff and teachers. It doesn't have hostel facilities.

The college has not yet established Career Guidance and Placement Cell. A Grievance Redressal Cell exists through which only grievances of minor nature are brought to the notice

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of the authority during last two years. There are a number of clubs and associations for undertaking varieties of useful activities. There is no hostel facility in the college.

Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

The total student strength of Netaji Nagar Day College in the academic year 2006-07 is 2484 including 987 girls, 28 from other states, 3 from overseas and the rest hail from West Bengal. The majority of the students are the children of displaced families from Bangladesh erstwhile East Pakistan. A number of students are first generation learners. These students try to fulfill their aspirations and ambitions for receiving higher education through this college.

The success rate of the students for the last 2 batches is 90.57% and 91.28% respectively. None of the students have secured university rank. The drop out rate of the same two batches of student is 16.9% and 13% respectively. The college admits that it does not have a formal system of monitoring pass-out students' progression effectively. However, as per an informal estimate, the college claims that about 30% of the students go for higher studies, while the remaining take up some jobs, set up their own business or, are engaged in other activities.

The college annually publishes its updated prospectus containing relevant information about the college including its vision and mission statements, admission rules and procedures, academic programs and subject options, fee structure and scholarships and financial aids for the students.

The recreational/cultural and sports facilities are available for the students. It organizes Educational tours, Adventure tours trekking along Himalayan routes. The college makes due effort to ensure student participation in curricular, extra-curricular and sports activities for their holistic personality development.

Financial aid is provided to poor and meritorious students in terms of scholarships, freeship, and SC/ST stipend. During the year 2005-06, 459 students received financial assistance amounting Rs. 6, 50,000 /-, The College organized Computer Training Program for SC/ ST Students in 2001 – 02.

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The college has recently established an Alumni Association which has not yet been associated with the development of the institution.

The college provides health facilities to its students through Students' Health Home through its membership. In addition it has introduced Mediclaim for the students.

Inspite of limited sports facility, the students of this college participate in various sports events, tournaments both at national and state levels. The college has produced a number of football players and earned a name in the country. In fact it has been regularly representing the university in this sport. The College students have won the Inter Non-Government State Football Championship organized by West Bengal Government on a number of occasions.

The college has a duly elected Students' Union, which organizes many academic, cultural and sports meets regularly. The college magazine published annually provides a forum for the creative writing of the students. To develop oratory and communication skill, the students' union organizes inter-departmental and inter-collegiate quiz and debate competitions where the students participate and some times bag prizes and medals. The students participate in various extra curricular activities through the Science Club, Eco Club etc. operating in the college. It provides ample opportunity to develop their personality and perspective. It is to be noted here that in November 2006, the Computer Science Department organized a software development competition among the UG and PG students of State universities and Technological Institutions of the State with financial grant from DST. In the year 2002 this department conducted a workshop in collaboration with Computer Centre on "Mobile Computing" for students of different colleges of West Bengal.

Criterion VI: Organization and Management

The College is a grant-in-aid, affiliated to the University of Calcutta and functions according to the rules and regulations of the said University and the Government of West Bengal. The Governing Body includes Principal, Government nominees, syndicate nominees, local councillors, teacher-members, non-teaching members and General Secretary of the Students' Union and the President of the Governing Body is an elected member. The Governing Body is the highest decision making body.



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There are different statutory bodies beside the GB, such as, Finance Sub-Committee, Development Sub-Committee, Academic Sub-Committee, Teachers' Council and Library Sub-Committee. These statutory bodies perform advisory duties. The College Development Committee formed as per the University regulations and the Finance Committee appointed by the Governing body are the next in hierarchy and are responsible for the day to day academic and the administrative functioning of the college. The Principal is authorized to appoint various sub-committees as per the requirements. The Teachers' council and sub-committees assist the Principal to regulate the chain of activities and take decisions regarding day to day academic as well as administrative affairs. The meetings of all statutory bodies including GB are regularly convened at least four times in an academic session. The resolutions of the Management Council le, Governing Body are mostly implemented. There is decentralization of power in the college. Works at grass-root level are performed by a number of committees and councils, and this ensures the participation and involvement of each employee in matters of organization and management of institution.

For the evaluation of the performance of the teachers, the college follows the Self-Appraisal scheme. It the Performance of non-teaching staff is assessed by the Principal annually, During the last five years the college has organized only one development programme for non-teaching staff. Both the teaching and non-teaching staff are given free computer awareness training by the computer centre of the college.

The college has perspective plan to introduce postgraduate level of education in different courses alongwith some job-oriented courses in near future. There is also a plan to develop a center for carrying out research in various fields. The West Bengal College Service Commission appoints the Principal and the permanent teachers. The part time teachers, guest lecturers, as well as contractual teachers are appointed by the College authority through advertisement in News paper followed by interview by a Selection Board consisting of panel of Principal, Subject expert, Government and Syndicate nominee on pre-set norms and procedures. The University appoints permanent non-teaching staff.

There is an external and internal audit system for the accounts of the College. The Finance Committee of the college first sanctions major purchases. The college invites tenders from willing suppliers. These tenders are processed by a Purchase Committee, which considers



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some stipulated parameters before passing the final order for purchase. The accounts are computerized and the staff is trained in computers.

During the year 2004-05 the college has received Rs. 12,363,598/- from the State Government as grant-in-aid, Rs. 24,99,485/- as fees from the students. The Computer Center has received Rs. 22 lakhs and Rs. 2 lakhs respectively from MPLAD and MLA Fund.

The Teachers' Council of the college prepares an Academic Calendar in consultation with the Principal, Heads of the departments and others well before the commencement of the academic year. The College staff avail of the supportive welfare schemes like loan from PF account, medical reimbursement. The Credit cooperative Society of the staff is certainly a great help, but some more welfare schemes by the management could also be initiated.

Different sections of the college community like teachers, students, non-teaching staff etc. have their own associations with elected representatives. These associations maintain harmonious relationship with the college administration.

Criterion VII: Healthy Practices

The College since the year of inception of existence has been thriving to provide the best of services possible within the available resources. In the process the institution adopted various practices, which not only provided as quality checks but also enabled the institution to imbibe in the students various values. The institution ensures the quality of its academic programmes of holding classes regularly in accordance with the routine and academic calendar, continuous assessment of students, offering personal counseling to students of different abilities, etc.

- The college management does not show any discrimination of caste, creed, and religion or gender right for the admission.
- A sense of social civil responsibilities, sense of discipline and dedication are imbibed among the students through various curricular, co-curricular and extra curricular activities.
- · Academic, administrative and financial aspects undergo periodic quality checks



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- Establishment of a KIDS CENTRE through which the college offers computer knowledge at an elementary level to the local children at a nominal cost.
- Decentralization of administration is undoubtedly a healthy practice conducive for nurturing efficiency and excellence.
- Reservation of Students' representation in Governing Body.
- The activities and programmes organized by the NSS unit, Eco club and the Science club are worth mentioning.

Section 3: Overall Analysis

The Peer Team, after careful consideration of the Self Study Report and after its two days visit to the various departments and physical facilities, is happy to note that the college is striving to achieve all round development in academic and other spheres of activities. The Peer Team would like to appreciate the institution for the following:

- The great concern of the founder and the current Management in providing access to quality and holistic higher education to the students is highly appreciable
- Introduction of three honours and one PG course during last five years.
- The success rate of the students is quite good; inspite of the cut-off being rather lowat entry level, but number of first classes is low.
- About 45% of the faculty has research degree.
- Various committees and office-bearers to share responsibility.
- The College in collaboration with the Computer Centre is bringing out biannual international journal of "Information and Computing Science" since 1997. It also publishes one national level Magazine COMSOMATH since 1997 with two issues in a year.
- Organization of a software development competition among the students of state university and technical institution.

With a view to its further improvement, the Peer Team would like to suggest the following to the college for its consideration:

 The college may think of introducing more number of interdisciplinary and employment oriented self-financing degree and diploma courses like Journalism and

Mass Communication, Tourism and Hotel Management, Industrial Chemistry, Computer Application, Business Administration and Banking etc.

- The College may establish a Language Laboratory and introduce a course on Communicative English, which has got high applied value in the present scenario.
- The College may start PG Courses in Physics, Computer Science, Bengali and English
- Mechanism for obtaining comprehensive feed back from Parents, Employers, Peers and other stake holders of the college through questionnaire and regular interaction followed by analysis and incorporation in the development process may be evolved.
- Continuous and sustained effort is to be made to shift the focus from teacher centred pedagogy to learner centred pedagogy.
- Conscientious efforts to be made by the departments to enhance the quality of teaching by effective use of the modern technology like computer, internet, LCD projector, Overhead Projector etc.
- The administrative functions and examination be fully computerized.
- Industry –Neighborhood interaction with the college be developed and strengthened.
- Teachers may be motivated to go for research, obtain research qualification, and publish more papers in standard and refereed national and international journals.
 They may be persuaded to apply for research projects from UGC and other funding agencies
- All departments may establish departmental libraries for the students and staff.
- The college may provide computer to all the departments with Internet facilities
- Effort be made to complete the automation of all the library services. The Central library be connected to departmental libraries through computer networking.
- · Career Guidance and Placement Cell may be created.
- Students' Progression may be monitored and full record of the same be maintained by the departments.




